ity," Jimmy Carter, the front - runner for the Democratic Presidential nomination told more than 2000 persons at the Jewish Educational Center here.

He pledged that "I would never yield on that point." The former Georgia governor said that "our constant and unwavering goal must be the survival of Israel as a just and lasting peace."

Carter, who was campaigning in the crucial New Jersey primary, said a Mideast peace depends "on Arab recognition of the right of Israel to exist as a Jewish State. This change must be reflected in tangible and concrete actions by the Arab countries."

He stressed he favors face - to - face negotiations between Israel and its Arab neighbors, not an imposed settlement. Carter said as President he would be committed to continuing aid to Israel and maintaining a strong American military presence in the eastern Mediterranean

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Premier Yitzhak Rabin has warned that the situation in Lebanon could become dangerous to Israel and to stability in the Middle East if Lebanon should come under control of either Syria or the terrorist organizations.

But the "various factors operating in Lebanon are aware of what moves and situations would be considered intolerable to us," he told the Knesset in a foreign policy review. Rabin also explained that the "Red Line," the unofficial label given to the situation that would cause Israel to intervene is not a geographic line.

He said it consists of several components, among them "the aim of the foreign forces operating in Lebanon and the targets against which they are operating; their geographical position and its proximity to Israel; their military strength, and the length of time they spend in a given area." Meanwhile it was disclosed that Rabin heads a committee of 10 Cabinet members and capier

Meanwhile it was disclosed that Rabin heads a committee of 10 Cabinet members and senior military officers which has been maintaining a close watch of the Lebanese situation. The Israeli leadership believes that the present split in the Arab world over Lebanon is only temporary and that Israel's interests may yet be harmed as a result of the conflict in Lebanon. Israel's policy, however, will continue to be one of watchful waiting.

Rabin and Foreign Minister Yigal Allon sent cables of condolences to President Ford over the murders in Beirut of Francis B. Meloy, (Continued on Page 3)

The Internal Revenue Service tried to make a black sheep out of a Lamb, but Floyd Lamb proved his fleece was white as snow. It was the same old story about the IRS.

They press charges in indictment and trial, regardless of what happens to a man's reputation only to have the whole thing thrown out. They take a man who spent a large part of his life as a public servant as a senior state senator, chairman of the Finance Committee, and accuse him of income tax violation on the flimsiest of evidence.

Floyd Lamb pleaded to prove his innocence in private session. Take a lie detector test. They refused.

Sen. Lamb is also Chairman of the Board of Nevada National Bank. He took a leave of absence from this capacity to stand trial. Every charge against him was denied or dismissed. For this the citizens of Nevada should be thankful for the integrity of U.S. District Judge Roger Foley.

We are doubly indignant at the humiliation, suffering and worry the IRS brought on the respected Lamb family. Sheriff Ralph Lamb, Floyd's brother, has been serving our community long and well. He's not the blustering, bellowing type who throws the weight of his office around. We once described him: "Ifi modesty was a crime, they should arrest Sheriff Lamb and throw the key away."

What we regret most of all from this unfortunate incident is the ordeal that must have been suffered by Mama Lamb. The many of us who have met her, know her for the decent, wonderful, remarkable woman she is. The high public offices attained by her children, and the respect they receive from the voters who elected them, reflects the training and responsibility spawned in them being brought up by their mother.

We've got to tell you the kind of people the Lambs are. They're not society. Not bluebloods, born with a silver spoon. They are: honest, down-to-earth, hard - working farmers, cowboys, who became leaders. But no matte how high they have risen, not a one of them has forgotten, or lost time for, concern for their mother. What a delight to observe them, each and every one, no matter how pressing or busy the occasion, dropping everything to phone "mama" asking: How was your day? How
