The Arabs and their supporters have so far been able to block any action. There is no reason to expect anything when West Germany, as scheduled, introduces an anti - terrorist measure at the General Assembly meeting opening in September.

Meanwhile something has to be done. First of all, as Israel has long demanded security measures at all airports must be tightened up. This is the least the airports and airlines owe to their passengers.

The United States either alone or in cooperation with other countries must begin instituting their own sanctions against countries which help terrorists or provide them sanctuaries. This could be done by refusing to allow its planes to fly to these countries and by refusing landing rights to airlines from countries that condone terrorists. If the U.S., West Europe and Japan would refuse to allow their planes to go to these countries they would be effectively cut off from world transportation. The U.S. could also re-duce or even cut out altogether any foreign aid to an offending country.

There are some who refuse to act against the terrorists because they claim they are acting out of political motives. The motives of the terrorists at Istanbul and Uganda are clear discourage people from going to Israel as a means of isolating and eventually destroying the Jewish State.

But this aside, people who travel around the world have the right to do so in safety and not at the whim of terrorists who rationalize their cause for 'carte blanch' murder.



# REAGAN AND FORD PERSONAL VIEWS

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The bitter fight between President Ford and former California Gov. Ronald Reagan for the GOP nomination as its candidate for President make it likely that the platform on issues of concern to the Jewish community would not be written before the start of the Republican National Convention in Kansas City.

Ford's own position the "Jewish ison the "Jewish is-sues" is on the public record he has established during his two years in the White House. This includes his advocacy of a record amount of aid Israel and the

Middle East diplomacy of his Secretary State, Henry Kissinger.

Reagan has said little on the Middle East. But in a memorandum to the platform com-mittee, he said "the United States should stand ready to con-tribute a just and dur-able peace" in the Mideast. Reagan said "Such a peace must absolutely assure the absolutely assure the continued security and survival of the State survival of the State of Israel with recognized boundaries accepted by all parties.
