

## RABIN SEES LONG LEBANON CONFLICT

JERUSALEM (WNS) The conflict in Lebanon will for a long time, Pre,-ier Yitzhak Rabin precontinue dicted in an interview with the Histadrut newspaper Davar,

However, he noted that once the conflict is over, the Lebanese border will present a special threat to Israel.

Meanwhile the Premier said that Syria is the "central military element in Lebanon" and that Sy-ria is "interested in a calm border with Israel to avoid any israeli pretext for intervention in Leba-non." Rabin said that the Lebanese conflict has prevented the Arab world from considering a possible settlement tlement with Israel while also lessening the danger of an Arab military coalition aga-inst Israel. "I prefer this reality ra-ther than a concentration of the radical Arab forces for a confrontation with Is-

rael," he said. Declaring that the Palestine Liberation Organization has destroyed the co-exist-ence between Moslems and Christians in Lebanon, Rabin said the Lebanese conflict has provided the opportunity for a public opinion campaign against the PLO. "The PLO has undoubtedly proved itself to be a cancerous body itself in the entire fabric of the Arab world," he said.

Meanwhile. the Israeli Minister of Agriculture is considering a request from South villagers Lebanese Israeli agricultfor ural experts to help them with various problems including a mysterious disease that has attacked their fruit trees. s. The Le-have also banese asked asken veterinarians inocu-their livestock against hoof and mouth disease.

In another development, Israeli army medical teams on the Lebanese border have distributing begun postcards to the Lebanese villagers to enable them to comwith relamunicate tives in Israel. Israel is considering allowing visits back and forth by Israeli and Lebanese Arabs,

When the founders of our country signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776, they intended "certain unalienable rights, along with Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happi-ness, that Government, instituted among men, derive their just powers from the consent of the governed."
