PHIL LAMPKIN FOR ASSEMBLY 15

Phil Lampkin, chairman of the Clark County Citizens Crime Prevention Council, is seeking nomination as a Democrat for the post of assemblyman in District 15.

Lampkin, a retired army lieutenant colonel and a former executive with the Mutual Broadcasting System, said the large growth in population in Nevada in recent years has been a factor in his decision to seek the assembly seat.

"Very few people realize that in the last five years Nevada has shown the third largest growth percentagewise in the United States, more than 21 per cent, and the majority has come to Clark County," said Lamp-

"One thing that has impelled me to be a candidate is that I feel changes must be introduced within our state legislative process so it can operate in a more effecient and timely manner to meet those problems which go along with this ment problems which he kind of expanding popula. could put to good use if tion."

Lampkin emphasized he did not think Nevada has a bad legislature "but I feel

some sort of reevaluation should be introduced in our become such a confusing islegislative process.'

In travels he has made, said Lampkin, "I've heard more and more people refer to Clark County and Las Vegas as a retirement community and not just a tourist community.

Lampkin said he also is a specialist in the labor-management field and has good insight into labor-manageput to good use if elected.

"I firmly believe in fiscal conservatism within our state so we can preserve a

balanced budget and a treasury surplus," Lampkin added. "I'm very definately opposed to a Nevada state income tax."

As chairman of the Citizens Crime Prevention Council, Lampkin said he feels more stringent statutes should be passed to mandate specific penalties for criminals.

"I intend to support legis-lation for manditory sentences for crimes committed with firearms and other

lethal weapons," he said. Lampkin also said he supports the Equal Rights Amendment because "I'm a firm believer in legal equal rights for men and women.

An unsuccessful candidate in 1974 for the state senate in District 2, Lampkin has attended the University of California, George Washington University and Washington and Lee Univ-

ersity while in the Army.

He is a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Retired Officers Association, the Masons and Shriners, and has been invested with the Legion of Honor of the Order of DeMolay. Presently, Lampkin also is administrative consultant to the board of directors of the University Crest Homeowners Association.

Lampkin said he has no outside business interests and that if elected he would be available to his constituents at any time.

DARRELL TANNER FOR ASSEMBLY 9

Darrell D. Tanner, 46, a businessman, filed his candidacy for assemblyman in District Nine.

Tanner, a Republican, of 1420 S. Eighth St. ownes Colonel Sanders Kentucky Fried Chicken Restaurants in four states, oil and gas wells and runs a ranching business in Utah.

He said he favors equal rights for all persons but "I have my reservations about certain areas of the Equal Rights Amendment."

"I have just begun to go through the amendment and will be prepared to voice my view on it in about two weeks," he said.

Concerning consolida-tion, Tanner said "consolidation is a very good thing if we can maintain efficient operation of government at ss cost.

He said the largest prob-lem Las Vegas is facing is growth.

"With rapid growth we have a strain of our expansion capabilities and support facilities."

He added that the city has to deal with the increasing crime problem by being tougher on criminals and by legislating acts which have

them going in the criminal direction," he said.

The state government should be vitally concerned that it is sensitive to the needs of the people and educating the voters, he said. Also, the state government should operate a strong fiscal policy.

"We should be concerned about not letting our favorable tax base erode and provide incentive for growth," he said.

Las Vegas Justice of the Peace candidate, Miriam Shearing, said that persons charged with cases pending in justice court should be asked whether they would prefer coming court in the eve-

Shearing notes that many persons with traffic and other offenses, or who have small claims charges, often work during the day and "might be better served" if their cases could be disposed in evening sessions.

Shearing said she was not proposing that evening sessions be established on a regular basis as a matter of immediate court policy, but said de-fendants could be polled to be deter-mined "whether in fact, evening sessions of the justice court would be in the best interest of serving justice court in Clark County."

Shearing, a Vegas attorney, а serves as an alternate juvenile referee.
