DORIS CASTON FOR ASSEMBLY 4

A 57-year-old special education instructor who filed as a Republican candidate in the Assembly District Four race noted her major concern is the high crime rate and the leniency given to minor offenders.

Doris Caston explained, "If a 16-year-old causes bodily harm in committing a robbery or a crime he should be treated as an adult. Furthermore, if a man is sentenced to serve five years, he should not be released in a few months as has been the case."

Caston has lived at 4321 Hanford Ave. for 12 years. She has two grown children. She works as a reading specialist at Will Beckley Elementary School.

Elaborating on her candidacy she commented, "I feel educationally qualified to represent the people and I am not tied in or affiliated with any special interest group. I want to be involved because I am a concerned and interested person."

Caston said if she is elected she will heed her constituents opinions on the Equal Rights Amendment. "The general public is not well informed as to its meaning

and limitations," she noted. "It would not downgrade the roles of mother and housewife since it does not affect private action. It will designate women to be as responsible as men are in our society."

"The question is, are women willing to assume that responsibility. Though I personally favor the amendment, I would prefer to see discriminatory laws made more specific than ERA states. I would not vote for ratification unless it was the desire of the people whom I represent."

Caston is an honorary life member of the Las Vegas Parent Teacher Association and chairman of the board of the University Club, a group promoting cultural and educational programs for adults.

Her other community activities have included participation in the International Reading Association, Council of Exceptional Children and American Choral Association.

She is also the recipient of an Optimists Club award for service to children.

If elected she will go by the opinion of

the constituents in District Four in voting on the Equal Rights Amendment.

"The general public is not well informed as to its meaning and limitations. Equality of rights does not mean to acclaim the equality of males and females, according to Professor Thomas Emerson of Yale University. It requires that each person, male and female, be treated as an individual. It would not downgrade the roles of

mother and housewife since it does not affect private action. It will designate women to be as responsible as men are in our society. The question is, are women willing to assume that responsibility. Though I personally favor the Amendment, I would prefer to see discriminatory laws made more specifically that E.R.A. states. I would not vote for ratification unless it was the desire of the people whom I represent."

PLAINS, GA. (WNS) -- Jimmy Carter, the Democratic candidate for the Presidency, has pledged that if he is elected he will take a strong stand against "boycotts of our corporations just because they may happen to have Jewish leaders."

Carter said he would propose legislation to make "tertiary boycotts" illegal. The tertiary boycotts involve companies that may not have direct Israeli or Jewish connections but are boycotted by the Arabs for doing business with companies that have such connections.

JAMES KELLY FOR DISTRICT JUDGE

Judge James B. Kelly, North Las Vegas Justice of the Peace, has filed his candidacy for the office of District Court Judge. Judge Kelly filed for Department 11 of the Eighth Judicial District Court of the State of Nevada (Clark County) which is a newly created department by the last legislature and is the only district court department which will be on the ballot this year.

Judge Kelly has served as Justice of the Peace for over six years and is known for his "tough on crime" attitude. Kelly's bail schedule for felonies is the highest in the State of Nevada.

Judge Kelly is well known in the county for his public service having served in numerous capacities including councilman and mayor pro-tem in North Las Vegas, as a director of the Clark County Fair and Recreation Board (now on the Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority), as vice-chairman of the Clark County Board of Equalization and in many other positions.

Kelly is a past president of the Las Vegas Sertoma Club and is presently serving as Committee Chairman of Explorer Post #375 Boy Scouts of America.

On filing, Judge Kelly said, "I am looking forward to the opportunity of serving the people of this country in the capacity of a district court judge. Since department 11 is now responsible for the juvenile court, I am especially excited about working with the young people to help them straighten out their lives -- but don't get me wrong, I strongly believe that juvenile offenders need to be handled with a firm hand."

Kelly, age 42, lives in North Las Vegas with his wife Devera and their children Cindy age 19 and Brian age 17.
