Mashau Conservative

The United Synagogue of America is about to undertake an historic venture as it launches the first agricultural settlement in Israel under the auspices of the Conservative Movement.

Modelled along the lines of the successful Moshav Sde Nitzan in the Negev, the new settle-ment will also be in the Negev. Like Sde Nitzan, it will be conducted on a cooperative basis with the traditional family structure maintained and personal property privately owned. How-ever, unlike any other moshav currently in existence, this one will have a homogeneous Conservative religious orientation.

Within a few years, the United Synagogue of America hopes to establish several additional moshavim in adjoining areas. The developments will be clustered around a common area which will service them with educational, health and other facilities, so that they will ultimately become a substantial community of moshavim. Immediate plans call for recruitment of 50 young couples, Conservative Jews, who want to

seize this unusual opportunity for Aliyah. Dr. and Mrs. Leonard Pinkas, leading mem-bers of Sde Nitzan, are spearheading the recruit-ment drive in the United States. They have just completed a cross - country tour in which they spoke to several synagogue groups. They are seeking young married couples, with or without children. They advise that each couple should be prepared to invest approximately \$15,000, in return for which they will receive a house for living quarters, plus two glasshouses for the production of agricultural products for export.

People prepared to invest themselves in this pioneering effort can expect not only ideologi-cal satisfaction, say the Pinkases, but a good

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the Lebanese civil war, has provided Israel with a much needed respite from the ever present danger of confrontation. Moreover, the brilliant commando raid in Entebbe has lifted the national depression which had gripped Israel in the wake of the Yom Kippur War. Because we are not exposed to an immediate emergency we canface up to the real issues that will determine the future of our people.

It is a widely held axiom that the State of Israel represents the most pivotal instrument for the preservation of the Jewish people under contemporary conditions. But it has become increasingly evident that the existence of the State of Israel in itself cannot provide an automatic guarantee on Jewish survival. While the exis-tence of the State may be one of the greatest miracles in history, it is by no means a miracle cure against the erosion of the will to survive as Jews. Unfortunately, notwithstanding the colossal achievements of Israel, assimilation and intermarriage exact an ever growing toll. There can be no doubt that vicarious identifi-cation with the State of Israel cannot serve as an adequate foundation for the preservation of Jewish identity.
