The need for the emblem (and the very concept from which stems, that the wounded and the sickmust not be left to their fate) first arose in the eighteen-six-ties, at which time the civilized countries were all Christian, No. wonder that they chose the sign of the cross - in red on white ground - as the emblem of mercy. However, when Moslem coun-tries joined the club of civilized countries, refused to let r own medical their own services be guided by this most Christian this most of all signs, and they

insisted on using the red crescent - as well as the red lion and sun (an emblem used exclusively in Iran) - instead: The Christian States conceded the logic of allowing Moslem countries to resort to emblems other then the cross. Yet, when the first sovereign Jewish State emerged and expressed the desire to use its own emblem, the Red Shield of David, it was felt that there were too many distinctive signs as it was and that there was no room for any addi-tion. The Geneva Conventions pronounce that the red cross on white ground is formed by reversing the co-lars of Switzerland as a compliment to that country. This is an ingenuous explanation, designed to assuage the feelings of States such as Israel but it fails to address itself to the two key issues, namely (1) the religious significance of the cross, even in the context of the Swiss colors; (2) the incontrovertible fact that Moslems have a leg-ally recognized alternative to the cross, actually two alterna-tives. Thus, of the three great monothereligions only Judaism - has istic one been denied recogni-tion of its traditional emblem.
