HERZOG ACCUSES ARABS OF DUPLICITY

UNITED NATIONS (WNS) -- Chaim Her-zog, Israel's Ambassador to the United Nations, accused the Arabs of a "most disgusting exhibition of double - talk, twoduplicity and unashamed hypocrisy" in their repeated attacks on Israel for relations with

South Africa, Speaking General A in the Assembly during the debate on South Africa's apartheid policy, Herzog declared that the Arab countries that accuse Israel of Arab collaborating with apartheid and racism, themselves have connections with the South African government. He accused the Arabs of having "ignored interests of the the African world in or-der to advance their goal for the des-truction of a member state (Israel.)

Presidency of Democratic Jimmy Carter on November 2 should mean continued strong support for Israel as well as other issues of Jewish concern.

The former Georgia governor stressed throughout his campaign that U.S. aid "must be responsive to Israel's needs" and that "Israel must feel secure in the support that it expects from America in order to take the necessary risks for peace." He also stressed that "the U.S. should not create the need for aid to Israel by eroding Israel's security through uncontrolled arms sales to Israel's adversaries." led arms sales to Israel's adversaries,'

Carter has opposed the Palestine Liberation Organization as "unrepresentative of the Pales-Organization as "unrepresentative of the Palestinians" and is against their participation as "an equal partner" in any resumed Geneva peace conference. "Any movement towards a solution to the Palestinian problem must emanate first from the Palestinians themselves," he has said. He has also urged that "any emerging Palestinian leadership must recognize Israel's right to exist permanently and in peace as a Jewish State in the Middle East."

Carter has approved support of the Jackson-Vanik Amendment requiring increased emigration of Soviet Jews as a condition of U.S. trade

tion of Soviet Jews as a condition of U.S. trade benefits and credits for the Soviet Union, But he has continued to maintain that "diplomatic means which would preserve the honor and independence of Soviet leaders would be the best way of encouraging the Soviet liberalization of its emigration policies." He has opposed the Arab boycott, vowed to fight moves to expel Israel from the United Nations, opposed efforts to restore prayers in the schools and has opposed quotas while approving affirmative action
