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PLEDGE OF NEW PREMIER BEGIN "PEACE ON ALL FRONTS"

ANTI-BOYCOTT LAW OFFICIAL

WASH. (WNS) -- The long-sought bill barring the compliance of American firms with the Arab boycott was signed by President Carter in a ceremony in the White House Rose Garden.

Attending were some 150 persons including Administration officials, members of Congress who played a leading role in the bill and representatives of Jewish organizations.

"This cooperative effort between the business community, Jewish leaders, Congress and the Executive branch can serve as a model for what can be accomplished in even more difficult areas, when reasonable people agree to sit down together in goodwill and good faith,"

the President said. "I am confident that the divisive issues in the Middle East which give rise to current boycotts can be resolved equally satisfactorily through a similar process of reasonable, peaceful cooperation." Carter said the Administration will enforce the law and "I am confident enforcement will help lessen tensions in the Middle East and hopefully lead to a permanent peace in the troubled region."

Rabbi Arthur Hertzberg, president of the American Jewish Congress, said the new law "affirms the determination of the American people to defend American principles of free trade and freedom from discrimination." He added the effort will be "incomplete unless the United States is joined by other nations similarly committed to the principles of the anti-boycott law."

The law was worked out as a compromise between the AJCongress, American Jewish Committee and the B'nai B'rith Anti-Defamation League and the Business Roundtable. A fact sheet issued by the White House said the "legislation will prohibit most forms of compliance with unsanctioned foreign boycotts, without unnecessarily jeopardizing U.S. political and commercial interests in the Middle East."

The legislation, which will be enforced by the Department of Commerce, preempts foreign boycott laws that have been adopted by about a dozen states.

Legalized Prostitution Part Three

(EDITOR'S NOTE: In the next, final installment, views submitted by readers will be reviewed. J.T.)

After the State Supreme Court declared houses of prostitution a public nuisance (about 20 years ago), those that had been in operation, since the beginning of Nevada as a state, were in a quandary. Their accepted status was up in the air.

Las Vegas and Reno, the two largest cities in the state, respected the high court edict and closed down the houses in their respective counties of Clark and Washoe. The pimps just moved across county lines and were back in business with barely any loss of time. Their business depended on tourist and visitor-prone Vegas and Reno. All they needed was an adjacent county where the authorities would play ball. That was before the local county governments passed their own interpretations of the state law to legalize prostitution. The reasons were obvious. Houses of prostitution paid high license fees. In addition, the traffic stimulated business and played an important role in the economy of the area.

In the so called cow counties, not dependent on trade from visitors to Reno and Vegas, the operation of whore houses again served the general welfare of the community. The local authorities played possum while the state law was in effect.

So it was in Winnemucca, where interesting circumstances developed. The status of prostitution in Nevada was in limbo, but five whorehouses were operating openly.

A minister of a small congregation sent a letter to the state's attorney general demanding the instant closure of the illegal houses of prostitution. The attorney general at the time was Roger Foley, now the federal judge. Foley notified the sheriff and district attorney of Humboldt County to close the houses in compliance with state law.

Winnemucca was a major cattle shipping center, where cowboys, after weeks-long drives, were paid off. Naturally they sought entertainment and relaxation. Winnemucca had always been known as a wide-open town, and here again the whore houses played an important role in the general economy.

When the status of the houses of prostitution
