

# JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- The Democratic Movement for Change and Likud have resumed talks about the possibility of the DMC joining the government coalition.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Religious and non-religious demonstrators clashed again July 7 over the Sabbath closing of a street in Bnei Brak.

PARIS (WNS) -- United Nations Secretary General Kurt Waldheim said here he doubted that the Geneva Conference could be resumed Oct. 10 as Israeli Premier Menachem Begin has suggested. He said Begin's statements on the West Bank would have to be clarified.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- The appointment of a former member of Hitler's SS as a Christian Democratic Union member of the West German Parliament has been denounced by the B'nai B'rith Anti-Defamation League as "an offensive and insensitive act of deep concern."

LONDON (WNS) -- Israel Supreme Court Justice Moshe Etzioni rejected a call by the Sunday Times for an independent inquiry of the allegation of torture of Arab prisoners by Israeli authorities which was alleged by the newspapers.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- The seizure of hostages at three Washington buildings last March was undertaken as a "holy war" against the "Zionist Jews," Hanafi Moslem leader Khalifa Abdul Khalis testified July 12.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- The 19th Maccabiah opened July 12 with nearly 3000 athletes from 34 countries participating.

CHICAGO (WNS) -- The Illinois Appellate Court ruled that a Nazi group can march in uniform through the predominantly Jewish suburb of Skokie but cannot wear swastikas.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Construction of a 25,000 seat sports stadium in northern Jerusalem will begin in two - three months, despite heavy opposition from Orthodox residents of the area, Mayor Teddy Kollek announced.

NEW YORK (WNS) -- A spokesman for the Lubavitcher movement said that "latent anti-Semitism" is at the root of mounting tensions between Blacks and Hasidim in the Crown Heights section of Brooklyn.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- "The Israeli government wants to negotiate but they don't want to say in advance what the conditions will be," Sen. Robert Dole (R. Kan.) said on Israel Radio after he had met with Premier Menachem Begin.

LONDON (WNS) -- Lord Byers, a leading liberal peer, introduced a bill in the House of Lords to combat the effect of the Arab boycott of Israel on British firms.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- President Carter was urged to recognize the Palestine Liberation Organization and invite its chief, Yasir Arafat to the White House by a delegation from American Arab organizations that called on the White House.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Dr. Benjamin Fein, a Soviet Jewish physicist and one of the leaders of the Jewish dissident movement in Moscow, arrived in Israel July 11 after a 3 - year campaign to emigrate.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- Dr. Israel Goldstein, Rabbi Emeritus of Congregation B'nai Jeshurun in New York City delivered the opening prayer for the closing session of the House of Representatives July 14.

TEL AVIV -- The seventh year of summertime vacation for Israel's hardest pressed mothers of low income large families was launched by Pioneer Women/Na'amat together with the Demographic Center of the Prime Minister's Office. Throughout Israel, 72 Pioneer Women camps are accommodating more than 6,250 mothers and their small children.

NEW YORK -- Rabbi Paul L. Halt, prominent leader in the American Rabbinate, was unanimously elected Executive Director of the New York Board of Rabbis.

## BEGIN BRINGS PROPOSALS FOR PEACE

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Israeli Premier Menachem Begin left for the United States July 15 saying that he would bring President Carter proposals for achieving a Middle East peace.

Begin continued his policy of not revealing these proposals until he meets with Carter at the White House. But in a statement at Ben Gurion air-

port, Begin declared "I bring his (Carter) proposals on how it is possible to achieve a lasting peace in the Middle East, a true and just peace in this area." Begin told newsmen that his proposals provide a framework for opening negotiations between Israel and the Arab countries. Begin said Israel wants no further war

since there is not a family in the country that does not grieve for a loved one who died in one of Israel's wars. But noting that Egyptian President Anwar Sadat has recently made some threats against Israel, the Premier declared: "I suggest to the Egyptian President to refrain from voicing threats of war because his people will not be intimidated by them

and will not give in to threats. We want peace but if attacked we have the strength to defend ourselves. Before leaving Begin met with former Premier Golda Meir, who he said gave him good advice, and briefed the Israel Editors Committee which is made up of the editors of all newspapers.

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
