JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Israel has adopted a new policy of "equalization of services" for residents of the West Bank and Gaza Strip, the Cabinet announced August 14.

But Cabinet Secretary Arye Naor stressed that this was a "humanitarian, not political" move and did not imply annexation or any other change in the legal status of the West Bank and Gaza. Besides, Naor added, it could not be annexation since "it is impossible for Israel to annex (these areas) since you cannot annex what belongs to you."

Naor said the new policy would provide the West Bank and Gaza Strip with the same level of such government services as health, welfare as Israelis receive. He said one example is that the pace of hospital building would be increased and that child labor which is now allowed on the West Bank and in Gaza would be

# \$50,000 Keno for 25c Competition is keen for the gamblers'

action in Las Vegas, and while generally there very little difference in odds offered by the various casinos at the gaming tables for the hard bettors, the enterprising gents at the Royal Inn have come up with a variance that could be attractive to the average Jane and Joe seeking to cash in a lot for a little investment. It is called the EXACTA in the game of Keno, where you mark your ticket for two successive games and add an extra quarter to the wager. If you are lucky the return is as-

the wager. If you are lucky the return is as-tronomical. Here's how it works. Keno, if you are not already aware, is a

sort of glorified Bingo game. There are eighty numbered ping - pong type balls. Twenty are called each game. You may mark a ticket from one to fifteen and wager as little as sixty cents. The return is proportionate to the amount of numbers you select --- if they are called. For instance if you mark one spot for 60 cents, and it is called, you receive \$1.80. For two spots, \$7.50, three spots \$26,00; four spots \$70.00; five spots \$300.00; six spots \$1,000, seven spots \$3,000; eight spots to 11 spots \$12,500 and 12 to 15 spots pays off at \$25,000.00

All this for 60 cents investment, but of course the numbers you mark must be called. It is not easy but it is an end-of-the-rainbow dream for a short bankroll. It is apparent the smaller number of spots you mark pays less but the chances of collecting are better.

The limit set by the State Gambling Commission on a single game of Keno is \$25,000.

This is to keep competing casinos on equal status. But Michael Gaugham and Frank Toti, who operate the Royal Inn Casino, have come

up with a new eye - catcher, the EXACTA, which could catch on because of the big payoff.

At first glance it appears to be a gimmick.

It is difficult enough to cash in on a single Keno game, no less two. But if you analyze it closely you may understand why it pays to make the wager on small spot selections. After all, most players, repeat the same spots, game after game. Why not add an extra quarter for the EXACTA to collect a bundle?

Here's a typical example of what that added 25 cents could mean.

You play a four spot for 60 cents. Two games would cost \$1.20. If you catch the four numbers on the first game the payoff is \$70.00. Two separate game payoffs would be \$140.00. The
