Yom Kippur, recog-ized as the holiest nized as the day of the Jewish year, will be observed by Jewish people throughout the free beginning at on Wednesworld, sundown on day, September 21st, and ending at sundown, Thursday, September 22nd.

Known as of Atonement, Yom Day brings Kippur Day bi to a close the ten days of repentance, which began with Rosh Hashonah, the first day of the Jewish New Year, 5738, on Tuesday, September 13th.

Since Biblical times, this day has been set aside to ask forgiveness of man's sins against God. Traditionally, religious Jews will observe a twenty - four hour period of total abstinence from food and drink. It is the Jewish belief that at sundown on Yom Kippur Day, God seals the Book of Life, in which he has written the fate of every individual.

Yom Kippur is also referred to as the Day of Judgment and so the

day is spent in re-ligious worship, Services begin at dusk on Wednesday evening, with the recitation of the Kol Nidre prayer and will be brought to a symbolic finish with a single blast the Shofar, the of ram's horn, at the close of the Nillah Services, just prior to sundown on Thurs-

day, Here in Las Vegas, services will be held at Temple Beth Sholom, 1600 E. Oakey Blvd., at 6:30 P.M. on Wednesday evening and from 9:00 A.M. to sundown on Thursday.

A11 services are conducted and offi-ciated by Rabbi Philip Shnairson, who will also deliver the High Holiday sermons. Cantor Joseph Kohn will chant the liturgy, assisted by the Temple High Holiday Choir un-der the direction of Morry King with Martha Olson at the organ.
