AVIV (WNS) -- Israeli officials reported that Arab terrorists seem to opened another have front in their military activities in southern Lebanon firing Katyusha rockets days in for three against popua row centers in lated northern Israel. WASHINGTON (WNS) -- Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan, who met all day with President Carter and Secretary of State Cyrus Vance, declared that "a formula will be found" to reconvene the Geneva peace conference before the yearend, despite differences between the United States and Israel.

"Americans better understand now our position," and "we shall be more understanding of the American position," Dayan told a press conference. Responding to questions, the Israeli Foreign Minister stressed Israel's refusal to deal in any manner with the Palestine Liberation Organization, it absolute rejection of any Palestinian "entity" or "homeland," its determination never to return to the pre-1967 borders and Israel's insistence on the right to establish Jewish settlements on the West Bank.

He acknowledged that the Carter Administration differed with Israel on these matters, but said that the President did not hint that he would use American aid to Israel as a means of pressure on the Jewish State. "I haven't felt anything of this kind," Dayan said. "The Issue of a Palestinian state is so important for us, I don't really think even though the U.S. and President Carter's position is different, they would impose it on us. They will try to convince us."

Dayan said that the reason he believes the Geneva conference can be reconvened this year is that Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and Jordanian King Hussein "really do want peace-their peace-- and -(to) achieve it by political means, not fighting a war to impose conditions," The Israeli leader stressed that Israel will continue to oppose "any known member" of the PLO from taking part in the conference.

Apparently Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan can see better into the future with one eve than most others can with two.

It was Dayan who kept insisting there would be a Geneva Peace Conference this year, despite pessimists in Israel and doubters in Washington. The Israeli cabinet has accepted the U.S. plan for peace, which is the first step towards talks at Geneva.

There was what was believed to be an impasse with no way out. The Jews refused to do business with the Palestine Liberation Organization. The Arabs insisted the PLO have representation. The U.S. State Department demanded the status of Palestinians must be settled in a comprehensive Arab-Israeli peace agreement.

Dayan would not take no for an answer. He knew that any and all diplomatic problems are negotiable and there was always room for compromise.

The foreign minister was due in Washington on a Monday. The previous Saturday he appeared in Paris instead of being on his way to New York. The next day Dayan was back in Israel to report to Premier Menachem Begin. Dayan refuses to disclose publicly why he was in Paris at the time or who he met there, but several members of the Saudi Ara-(Continued on Page 4)
