## SILENCE IS GOLDEN AT CAMP DAVID AS TALKS GO ON IN VEIL OF SECRECY

### NEGATIVE STEREOTYPING OF JEWS CONTINUES

WASH. (WNS) -- Negative stereotypes of Jews continue in the United States although an increasing majority of Americans believe that anti-Semitism is on the wane.

A survey by the Lou Harris organization for the National Conference of Christians and Jews also found that sympathy for Jews as victims of persecution is eroding. The poll, which dealt primarily with Black-white relations, found

that only eight percent of Americans feel that anti-Jewish prejudice is increasing while 82 percent

of non-Jews report "pleasant and easy" relationships with Jews. Most Americans feel Jews are not discriminated against but one in four said that "Jews are irritating because they are aggressive," are "more loyal to Israel than America," and that "most slumlords are Jewish."

The poll also found that Blacks tend to be more anti-Jewish than any other group and that Jewish attitudes toward Blacks are hardening. However, by a 38-36 percent plurality, Blacks feel that "Jews have supported rights for minority groups more than other white people."

### FIRST JEW

MONTREAL, (JTA) -- For the first time since the Order of St. John was founded in the 11th Century, a Jew has been appointed to high office, it was reported here.

Maj. Louis M. Bloomfield, a well-known attorney and philanthropist of Montreal, has been elected president of the Quebec Council of the St. John Ambulance Association. Bloomfield was named Knight of the Order in 1965 and is the only Jew to hold that position.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- The United States, Israel and Egypt are conducting ministerial talks on ending the deadlock in the Israeli-Egyptian peace negotiations behind a total veil of secrecy at Camp David.

Reporters are briefed about the talks between Secretary of State Cyrus Vance, Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan and Egyptian Prime Minister Mustapha Khalil at the State Department, some 60 miles from the Presidential retreat in the Maryland mountains.

State Department spokesman Hodding Carter told reporters, "My instructions are even clearer -- not to be clear." The secrecy started when Dayan and Khalil arrived separately at Andrews Air Force Base outside Washington Feb. 20 and were immediately whisked away to Camp David even though both had expected to make statements.

"All three ministers have reaffirmed their determination to bend their best efforts toward successful completion of the negotiations as soon as possible." The State Department said that "all the ministers agree" that the remaining problems holding up a peace treaty "should be handled as a package and they are approaching them in this manner." The major problem is still Egypt's demand that a peace treaty be linked with movement toward self-rule for the Palestinians on the West Bank and Gaza Strip.

President Carter, in a major foreign policy address at the Georgia Institute of Technology, said that the "recent disturbances in the Middle East, a reference to Iran, have underlined the need to work even more urgently toward peace between Israel and its Arab neighbors." Carter stressed that "I will do whatever I can to promote the success of the Camp David negotiations, including the calling of another summit conference if that should be necessary and the parties show adequate flexibility. I urge all leaders in the Middle East to recognize the vital importance for the region that these talks succeed."

Carter also stressed that "we are intensifying our efforts to promote stability throughout

### Fever Rising Again on Gaming Stocks

Stock market fever is very contagious. But when you live and work in Las Vegas and the market fever involves gambling stock, the combination is just too much to dismiss lightly.

After this story is written, Resorts International will learn if it is granted a permanent gambling license as required by the State of New Jersey. There are three alternatives: A-Resorts is granted a license, B-Resorts is turned down, C-Resorts is closed down, but the hearing still continues.

The word from knowledgeable sources here is that Resorts is a "shoo-in." Resorts has spent hundreds of thousands of dollars on a staff of brilliant eastern attorneys who presented an unbelievable case for their client. On the other hand, the State of New Jersey has presented a case that if anything is quite inadequate. Encouraged by New Jersey, Gov. Brendan T. Byrne, who predicted a victory over organized crime, through denial of Resorts' gambling license, the State of New Jersey proceeded to launch a surprisingly weak case against the New Jersey hotel and casino.

Now this is how the stocks reacted. Resorts (RSA) has moved from about \$25.00 a share to \$45 a share in the last month.

Caesars World (CAW) is planning a May 28th opening of a 500 plus room hotel and casino. Caesars is already instructing about 700 New Jersey residents how to deal Las Vegas style: black jack, roulette, craps, Keno, poker and baccarat. CAW moved from \$26 to \$40 in anticipation of Resorts licensing and the opening of its own casino.

Before the July 4th weekend, Bally Mfg. (BLY) is planning the opening of a 1,000 room hotel and casino with the formidable William Weinberger at the helm. BLY has moved from \$40 to \$60 a share recently.

Hilton, Harrah's and MGM are planning a venture on the same six-acre property with three separate hotels on the drawing boards.

Ramada Inns, Elsinore Corp., Holiday Inns, Golden Nugget and Playboy all have casinos in the works.

How does this affect Las Vegas? Well, we certainly didn't like the idea of losing our gambling monopoly. But since this is not a question but a reality, we are going to cash in
