"Without concrete action our words are hollow," he said in a solemn ceremony in the Rotunda of the U.S. Capitol marking International Holocaust Day. Some 1000 persons attended, including members of the House and Senate, _distinguished Americans and members of the President's Commission on the Holocaust which is charged with the task of recommending a Holocaust me-

morial for the United States.

President Vice Walter Mondale opened the moving ceremony which he said commemorated the "tragedy and vibrant resilience of the human spirit." The 48member Boys Choir wearing of Atlanta, yarmulkas, "Ani Maamin' and partisan songs in Heand Yiddish. brew Many wept as Rabbi Bernard Raskas of Minneapolis recited the Kaddish and Cantor Isaac Goodfriend of Atlanta sang El Mole Rachamim.

Six candles, memory of the six million Jews died in the Holocaust, were lit by Elie Wiechairman of the President's Holocaust Commission; former Supreme Court Justice Arthur Goldberg Murray Berkowitz, of Miami, Auschwitz survivor. A seventh candle was lit by Alex Manoogian,

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Israel and Egypt became officially at peace April 25 when the two countries exchanged the documents ratifying the peace treaty at a ceremony at the U.S. monitoring facility at Umm Hashiba in the Sinai.

The exchange of the documents was delayed for almost three hours after the ceremony had started over a last minute hitch. Both Eliahu Ben - Elissar, director general of Premier Menachem Begin's Office, and the senior Egyptian delegate, Saad Afra, had to check with their respective capitals to iron out the dispute. Israeli officials said the delay was caused by changes in the Egyptian wording on a letter dealing with autonomy for the West Bank and Gaza Strip which accompanied the peace treaty. The Egyptian letter dropped the word "inhabitants" when speaking of autonomy for the two areas. Israel's position is that autonomy will be granted to the residents of the area, not to the areas as such. The two sides agreed that an additional letter will be issued which states that neither side will stray from the precise language of the treaty signed in Washington.

The ceremony was brief and impressive as Israeli and Egyptian honor guards stood side by side for the first time as the Egyptian and Israeli flags, along with those of the United States and United Nations, were raised. Speaking for Egypt, Afra said the treaty would be "an important step in the search for a comprehensive peace in the area and for the attainment of the settlement of the Arab - Israeli conflict in all its aspects." He said Egypt was certain the process begun by the peace treaty "will create a mimentum essential for the achievement of the global peace we all aspire for.'

Ben - Elissar said Israel saw the peace treaty as a first step "toward the compre-


