that he would attempt to trim the payroll another five percent within a year.

"Such a staggering increase could perhaps be justified," the 48 - year - old director of Associated Pathology Laboratories said, "if there were a corresponding increase in the amount and quality services provided by the city. Quite an awful frankly, people feel lot of the city's services have deteriorated, not improved."

Grayson said his proposed payroll slash consistant with public's passage Proposition #6. "The people have made it abundantly clear that they want the cost of government trimmed," he said. "We have to start somewhere and that is as good a place as any."

"Mayor Briare would like people to believe that he is a fiscal conservative." Grayson said, "but the facts don's support his self-image.' Grayson reminded voters that back in 1976 Briare said he would like to see passed by a law the Nevada Legislature requiring municipal employees be given an automatic cost - of - living raise each year.

However, Brown, president of the Las Vegas City Employees Association said at the time it would be "financially irresponsible to have the state mandate automatic raises if there wasn't condition that the entity be able afford it."

Grayson said the Mayor should have held the line inadditional expenses, including the hiring more than 500

ing tration, bringing the total number of city employees to with a pro-1,500, payroll of posed \$28,000,000 for fiscal year 1979/80.

The City's official estimated population in was 149,750. 1975 Today's population according to City Hall is 161,021, showing an increase of only 11,271 persons or 8 percent.

"It is inconceivable how the major can justify hiring 500 more employees to handle any additional work load created by these 11,271 new arrivals."

The average cost of each City Hall employee is \$18,666 a year.

"There are thou sands of hard-presse taxpayers in Las V gas who's love earn that much,' he said.

"Instead of mainwhat has taining fed to the been as "bare bones budgets," Grayson said, "City Hall has become a proliferation of unneeded public jobs. Knowing how politicians and governments operate, it is fair to assume that there is a great wasted efdeal of fort."

He admitted his plan would not make him popular down at City Hall, "But we have to make hard decisions that are sometimes unpopular if we are to solve the very serious problems our community faces," he said. "For example, we have an immense traffic snarl and perhaps the money saved through payroll cutbacks could be utilized to get raffic moving quickand smoothly again."

HOUSE NIXES PLO TWICE

WASH. (WNS) --The House of Representatives took against two steps the Palestine Liber-Organization ation April 24, one barring any member of the PLO from entering the country and the other reducing the U.S. contribution to the United Nations by the cost of the U.S. share of two propaganda PLO units.

Both steps were amendments to the bill authorizing money for the State Department which was approved by the House and sent to the Senate for action. No debate was held on the amendment by Rep. Lester Wolff (D. NY) to cut the U.S. contribution to the cost

of the UN Unit on Palestinian Rights and the Committee on the Exercise of the Inalienable Rights of the Palestinian People which is estimated to total Wolff \$150,000. stressed he would not advocate cutting funds for a UN program just because he disagreed with it, but having such a group "which regularly takes credit for terrorist violence against civilians represented in a body whose aim is the peaceful solution of conflicts in outrageous."
