ISRAEL GETS LAUNDROMAT IN SINAI

EL ARUSGM Sinai
(WNS)--The Egyptian-
Israeli Joint Military
Committee, which is
meeting here to work
out details of the re-
turn of El Arish to
Egypt, reached an
agreement May 6 on
a laundromat in the Is-
raeli settlement of
Neot Sinai.

Egyptian Brig. Gen.
Safih A-Din and Is-
raeli Gen. Dov Sion,

co-chairmen of the
committee, agreed
informally that the
laundromat, the main
source of income for
the settlement, will
be outside the Egyptian
lines when El Arish
is turned over to
the Egyptians.

This will hold
for three years
until Israel completes
its withdrawal from
the Sinai. The laundro-
mat workers will be
allowed to cross the
Egyptian lines. The
meeting also dis-
cussed the problem
of water for Israeli
soldiers after the
Egyptians take control
of the water supplies.

However, the chief
attraction May 6 was
not the joint com-
mittee but the arrival
of some 50 Egyptian
journalists who came
to cover the session.
Hundreds of residents
of this city, the capi-
tal of the Sinai, cheer-
ed the newsmen. They
waved Egyptian flags,
sang the Egyptian
national anthem and
chanted slogans sup-
porting Egyptian
President Anwar
Sadat.

ISRAELITE ADS PAY

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Premier Menachem
Begin has urged President Elias Sarkis of
Lebanon to come to Jerusalem to negotiate a
peace treaty with Israel.

"I am also willing to go in a civilian plane
to Beirut to reach a peace agreement," Begin
said in a speech to the Knesset May 7. The
Premier said the problem of the Palestinians in
Lebanon could be solved by resettling them in
Saudi Arabia, Libya, Syria and Iraq. He also
called for the removal of the Syrian troops
from Lebanon and pledged full cooperation
with the United Nations Interim Forces in Le-
banon (UNIFIL).

Begin's remarks came against a background
of Israeli air attacks on Palestinian terrorist
encampments in Lebanon. Israeli planes at-
tacked terrorist concentrations at Naher el
Bared near Tripoli in North Lebanon May 6,
hit terrorist bases near the village of Riham,
12 miles north of the border, May 7 and again
May 8 and bases south of the Zaharani River
May 8. In his May 7 Knesset speech, Begin
declared that Israel will hit the terrorists
wherever they are so that there is no repetition
of the attacks such as at Nahariya, where ter-
rorists killed four Israelis, two of them children.
"We shall hit those murderers wherever possi-
ble, in every place with all our power, from the
sea, the land and the air, until they are no

Hooray for Greenspun

Hank Greenspun does not believe there is a
gas shortage, opening his column with "The
oil companies have a license to rob the public
because the elected officials who gave them the
authority steal themselves."

He calls the energy crisis a "contrived
shortage of gasoline."

Don Digilio says he has not met one single
person who believes there is a gas shortage.

Hank says war has been declared against
the huge oil companies who quite literally control
the present and future of our country.

Which is what we've been screaming for
months. There is no gas shortage, there is
no gas shortage, there is no gas shortage. The
gas companies are robbing us blind. But more
than the exorbitant prices being charged, is
the indignity of lining up like puppets at the
stations hoping to get the necessary gas. Some
of the lines stretch for blocks and blocks. How
long will the public stand for that?

While Greenspun is the natural leader to
head the public cause, he left out one important
factor. How to fill every gas station with auto
fuel as soon as possible.

That's where Sen. Paul Laxalt came in.
Laxalt urged state legislators to grant Nevada
leaders the authority to buy gasoline on the open
market in an unprecedented move to fight the
fuel pinch. Paul said, "this is one of those
obvious cases in which we shouldn't rely on the
oil companies. We should go it alone."

He said the U.S. Dept. of Energy told him
the Caribbean fuel market has excellent supplies
for sale, and the state would not have to go to
more expensive European markets. Laxalt's
proposal is aimed at temporary relief to ensure
that the state's tourist-oriented economy will
make it through the gas shortage this summer.

Greenspun winds up his column about the
truth of the gas shortage:

"President Carter, the oil company execs,
and even our lowliest legislators and public offi-
cials should recall the words of President
Abraham Lincoln:

"If you once forfeit the confidence of your
fellow citizens, you can never regain their res-
pect and esteem. It is true that you may fool
all the people some of the time; you can even
fool some of the people all the time; but you
can't fool all of the people all of the time."

"And that's why they called him 'Honest
Abe,' which is more than we can say for the
damned oil companies."

Now that Greenspun, at his level, started the
ball rolling, he could do something more concrete
by leading the public outcry.

If successful, it could lead to a Pulitzer
Prize.
