No Anti-Israel Raps

An amazing thing happened when the International Labor Organization opened its annual conference in Geneva this month. There were no anti - Israel resolutions on the agenda.

Of course, there were still Arab attacks on Israel during the conference. Iraq, as usual, called for Israel's expulsion from the ILO. Egypt criticized Israel's policies in the West Bank as other Arab delegations walked out in protest to the signing by Egypt of a peace treaty with Israel.

But for the first time in years there were no moves for the formal condemnation of Israel or its expulsion. The reason is not hard to find. The United States, fed up with the politicization of the ILO, walked out in late 1977, taking with it the annual contribution of the U.S. which accounted for 25 percent of the ILO's budget. The ILO had to reduce its staff, trim programs and eliminate publications.

There is a lesson here for the other specialized agencies which have allowed the Arabs and their supporters to subvert the organizations for political purposes. The U.S. seems to have found an effective means for stopping this practice, at least for now.

But it is the underdeveloped countries which should also learn something. The work of the ILO, UNESCO, the world Health Organization and other specialized agencies is more important to them than to Israel or the major industrialized nations. Subverting these agencies hurts the developing countries of Asia and Africa just as they have been the chief victims of the raise in OPEC prices.

It is time that Asian and African countries convince their Arab colleagues in the Third World to confine politics to the General Assem bly and the Security Council. Those two bodies provide enough time and space for political posturing to allow the specialized agencies to get on with their jobs of trying to make a dent in conquering the world's social, economic and health problems.

Behind The Scenes At The United Nations

Arab Duplicity

UNITED NATIONS (WUP) -- The malcontent Arabs, notorious in their perennial attempts to deceive UN Members on all issues affecting the Jewish State, last week outdid themselves in this their sinister game of deception when the Security Council resumed its debate on a Lebanese complaint against Israel's anti - PLO operations and also took up the extension of UNIFIL whose mandate expired this month.

Spearheading the campaign in this lying, double - dealing Arabian 'pastime' was the Arab member in the Council, the snippy young Abdallah Yaccoub Bishara of Kuwait, who, in his diatribe, charged Israel with "waging a campaign of genocide against the Palestinians" and urged that the UN take drastic action.

aping the Kuwaiti included, among others, the Ambassadors of Iraq, Libya, Syria and the PLO spokesman, all of whom were supported by the Czechoslovak member of the Council, Ilja Hulinsky, who voiced the view of the Communist bloc. Without exception, each one of them exploited the occasion to denounce the Egyptian - Israeli Peace Treaty.

Poor Lebanon, its envoy Ghassan Tueni stated his tragic nation's case in a tone of deep sadness. His country, split into numerous contending factions -- Syrians, PLO terrorists, Leftists, Christians and Moslems divided among themselves, he could only bemoan: "Five years of war, dispersion and destruction are more than enough. So give us back our land, for never shall we cede, forget o'r forgive." Apparently, this was meant as a plea to the UN to rescue his country from the clutches of the 'aliens.'

What amazed your correspondent was the skill with which Ambassador Yehuda Z. Blum was able on almost a moment's notice to unmask in a masterful rebuttal the Arab duplicity. At the outset, he made it clear that the Council Resolution 425, which established UNIFIL, had taken cognizance of the fundamental problems of Lebanon, which, he said, "extend throughout the length and bredth of that troubled country." But, he noted that "there was a built - in contradiction between that recognition and UNIFIL's mandate which was limited in scope and confined to the south of Lebanon."

Blum went on to remind the Council that "UNIFIL's area of operation was further restricted in practice by the PLO which prevented by force of arms UNIFIL's entry into the Tyre pocket. The PLO weakened UNIFIL's effectiveness still further," Blum stressed, "by infiltrating several hundreds of its terrorists into the area under UNIFIL control and also by challenging it directly, with growing intensity in recent months.

"Israel appreciates the efforts made by the officers and men of UNIFIL who are serving in the most trying conditions, and hopes that the outstanding problems will be solved in the near future to the satisfaction of those directly and legitimately concerned," the dynamic Israel Ambassador told the Council. "It is, therefore, a matter of regret," he emphasized, "that the Representative of Kuwait expressed himself in such unconstructive terms, engaging in diversionary tactics by introducing issues totally extraneous to the matters under discussion. In so doing, he confirmed once again that he is the undisguished spokesman in the Council of the rejectionist Arab States, unable to let pass any opportunity to continue the political warfare against peace in the Middle East."

Yehuda Blum then put the Arab member of the Council to shame by declaring that "the

record of Kuwait and the group of States it represents scarcely qualifies it for membership in this Council." As these words resounded in the Chamber, Bishara, smirking, was seen moving back and forth in his seat in a state of nervousness and his show of unease betrayed a guilt - complex. "Over the last 30 years," Blum continued in his rebuttal, "that group of Arab States has violated, with regard to Israel, every purpose and principle of the Charter. In this respect, they have ignored, inter alia, Article 2 (1) of the Charter -- that is, the principle of the sovereign equality of all Members of the Organization; Article 2 (3) which lays down the duty of States to settle their international disputes by peaceful means; and Article 2 (4), which prohibits the threat or use of force against the territorial integrity or political independence of any State."

As this writer studied the facial expressions of the fifteen delegations -- five permanent with veto power and 10 elected for a two-year term on a regional basis -- while Blum was speaking, it appeared clear that this expression betrayed a recognition on their part of the factual truth of his words. But the delegates, governed by the foreign policy of their home regimes, dare not express their own views. Hence Arab deception finds fertile ground in this most important UN organ.

Blum was fully aware of this fact when he told them that "the crucial question before this Council in the present context is whether an end will be put once and for all to the use of Lebanese territory for acts of aggression against Israel and to what extent UNIFIL will be instrumental in this. In this context," he continued, "attention has been drawn to the terrorist PLO's 'reaffirmation' of its so-called 'commitment' not to initiate any action from inside the UNIFIL area of operation and not to shell Israel Defense Forces or the local Lebanese forces in the South from Lebanese territory 'unless they are attacked first.'
