BEGIN RETURNS FROM EGYPT WITH TALK OF PEACE, FRIENDSHIP, OIL

SAUDI ARABIA UPS OIL PRODUCTION

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Saudi Arabia's promise to increase oil production is not linked to the negotiations between Israel and Egypt for Palestinian autonomy on the West Bank and Gaza Strip, Robert Strauss, President Carter's special Middle East envoy, stressed in a television interview.

The Saudis "asked for nothing," Strauss said on the Public Broadcasting Service's "MacNeil/Lehrer Report." He said that when he met with Saudi Arabian Crown Prince Fahd during his recent visit to the Mideast they discussed the differences between the

U.S. and Saudi Arabia on the Palestinian issue but Fahd made it clear he was not linking oil production to the political issue. Strauss said Fahd wanted to demonstrate that the Saudis are a "responsible supplier of oil to the world."

On the autonomy talks which he attended in Alexandria, Egypt, Strauss said the agreement between Israel and Egypt to establish working committees for which he is credited, advanced the negotiations. "one - half of one percent of the job." He said the negotiations will be "long, protracted, difficult, hard."

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Premier Menachem Begin returned recently from three days of talks in Egypt and declared that Israel and Egypt "are actually beginning to pass from the stage of peace to the stage of friendship, mutual understanding and cooperation." Begin who had two long sessions with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat in Alexandria returned obviously pleased by his latest trip.

Sadat called the talks "the most important talks we have had so far." The two leaders acknowledged that they did not agree on the Jewish settlements on the West Bank but said they agreed not to play up the rift or allow it to harm the ongoing talks for autonomy for Palestinians on the West Bank and the Gaza Strip.

These talks were mentioned only in passing and the two leaders obviously are content, for the present, to leave the negotiations to lower level echelons. Both Begin and Sadat said they agreed that the integrity of Lebanon should be preserved. Sadat brought up the Israeli air raids during their conversation but he said nothing when Begin told the press conference the raids were an act "of absolute" legitimate self - defense.

Sadat made it clear that he would not be deterred from his peace efforts by opposition from the rest of the Arab world. "We are launched on a way from which we will never go back," he declared. "Let us see what Egypt can do without the Arab world and what the Arab world can do without Egypt."

Upon returning to Jerusalem, Begin announced that Israel's future oil supplies have been secured. He said that after Israel returns the last Sinai oilfields in the Sinai to Egypt Nov. 26 it will be able to acquire oil from these fields

KNESSET RAPS ARAFAT MEETING

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- The Knesset adopted a resolution condemning Austrian Chancellor Bruno Kreisky and former West German Chancellor Willy Brandt for meeting in Vienna with Yasir Arafat, head of the Palestine Liberation Organization. The

resolution, supported by the government coalition and major opposition parties, asserted that "the PLO's aim is the annihilation of Israel and its method is premeditated murder."

Leading off the debate, Premier Menachem Begin cited part of the PLO's "Palestine Covenant" which he called a "second Mein Kampf" and listed the various terrorist acts the PLO committed.

He said that if Arafat were to triumph Brandt would have to fall on his knees once again and ask forgiveness of history as he did at the Warsaw Ghetto Memorial when he visited Poland as Chancellor of West Germany. Labor Party chairman Shimon Peres said the Vienna meeting had caused him "surprise, shock and grief."
