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### Teaching the Children

It is encouraging to learn that more and more high schools across the country are teaching about the Holocaust. This was demonstrated when more than 200 educators attended a recent two - day Second National Invitational Conference on Teaching about Genocide and the Nazi Holocaust in Secondary Schools. The conference, which was held in Arlington, Va., was sponsored by the Center for the Studies in the Holocaust of the Anti - Defamation League of B'nai B'rith and the National Council for Social Studies.

The increased attention given to the Holocaust is increased evidence of the interest in this tragic period not only by educators but also by students themselves. The recent NBC-TV series "Holocaust" of course has played a part in arousing this interest. One of the teachers at the conference described how he presented a filmstrip on what happened to one German Jewish family to his class of 75 in Fairfax County, Va., nearly all of them white Anglo - Saxon Protestants. The class knew very little about the Holocaust but then the response was "a tremendous amount of thought by students and on where they are now." The teacher plans to expand the section on the Holo-

This development is very important. It means that the memory of the Holocaust will not die out with the survivors. It is thus important that teachers be trained to teach about the Holocaust, as the ADL is attempting to do, and that good educational material be developed.

caust from two to six weeks.

But it must also be stressed, as it was at the Arlington conference, that the Holocaust be taught in the context of Jewish history so that a stereotyped picture of Jews as "eternal victims," not be left. The best way to do this is to also stress the accomplishments of the Jewish people as well as the creation of Israel by survivors committed to life, and to the establishment of a just society.

# Behind The Scenes At The United Nations

## Nixon Was Israel's Pal

UNITED NATIONS (WUP) -- In his 344-page Memoirs, which reached the desk of your correspondent here on the eve of this historic month of November, Yitzhak Rabin speaks out bluntly about a number of American and Israeli leaders with whom he had to deal during the critical days of his incumbency as both Ambassador to the United States commencing in 1968 and as Prime Minister which post he assumed in 1974.

What stands out as most revealing in his fascinating and very well - written biography is not only what he discloses about the difficulties, he encountered time and again with

Abba Eban and Shimon Peres in the course of his duties in both posts but also the amazing things he has to say about his many contacts with President Nixon and Henry Kissinger in periods of crisis for his struggling nation.

Throughout his Memoirs, published by Little, Brown & Company, Sabra Rabin hails Nixon as a genuinely true friend of Israel. In Chapter 9 captioned "Anatomy of a Cease-Fire", he delves deep into the history of the 'Rogers Initiative' of 19 June 1970 -- a hectic period for the Jewish State and its then Prime Minister Gofda Meir who reluctantly accepted her Ambassador's advice to give Nixon a somewhat 'positive' diplomatic reply to that 'initiative' "whose professed aim" via Dr. Jarring "was to 'stop shooting and start talking" with Egypt and Jordan

But then something happened that shocked the West, especially the U.S. "The Soviet-Egyptian missile system had been moved toward a new line about 30 kilometers west of the canal and a number of Egyptian - manned missile batteries had been stationed even closer to the canal," Rabin recounts. "Furthermore, our attack on the missile system had been unsuccessful and several phantoms had been shot down in the process. This was a new and far more perilous situation," Rabin points out, "The next day, the President responded sharply by defining the latest Soviet move as an offensive action and sending the Russians a stronglyworded warning that the Middle East was 'a very dangerous region, like the Balkans before World War I. The two Great Powers would have to be very careful in their action to prevent a confrontation which neither wants..."

Rabin then notes that "Israel was in a terrible bind. On the one hand," he said, "the political text of the Rogers initiative was not acceptable to her. At the same time, if the Egyptians rejected the cease-fire proposal, our planes were helpless against the missile system that had crept forward toward the canal. Three weeks went by while both sides remained mute on the subject of the Rogers initiative. Then, on July 22, Sisco notified me that Egypt had defied all expectations and had accepted it..."

Nixon was anxious about Israel's likely reaction to the Egyptian reply, Rabin notes and then proceeds to cite a letter which the President sent to Golda "asking her to consent to the initiative in order to prevent bloodshed." Some Israelis, he happily stresses, considered the letter "a latter - day Balfour Declaration." Rabin quotes it verbatim:

We will adhere strictly and firmly to the fundamental principle that there must be a peace agreement in which each of the parties undertakes reciprocal obligations to the other. No Israeli soldier should be withdrawn from the present lines until a binding contractual peace agreement satisfactory to you has been achieved."

Anyone interested in the history of Israel's rebirth as a sovereign nation must not miss reading Yitzhak Rabin's chronicles of this rebirth. His Memoirs fill many gaps left open in the recent biographies of Herzog, Dayan, Eban and other distinguished Israeli leaders.
