JERUSALEM (WNS) -- More than a thousand members of Israel's Black Panther movement and residents of poor neighborhoods staged violent demonstrations against the government's new austerity program and its allocation of funds for settlements on the West Bank. The demonstrators burned tires, hurled rocks at police and set one police car on fire. Some demonstrators were injured in clashes with police and an unknown number were arrested.

Large numbers of slum residents staged 10 demonstrations shouting "ten pounds is too much for milk" -- a reference to sharp price increases -- and "the government must fall." They shouted obscenities at various Cabinet Ministers. Police, responding in force, blocked one band of protestors seeking to reach Premier Begin's residence. However, the police urged the Panthers not to take out their anger on the police since there was no conflict between the police and the public over economic mea-

Charley Biton, a Black Panther leader who is a member of the Knesset, used a bullhorn in the Knesset to shout protests against new Finance Minister Yigal Hurwitz, who developed the new economic program aimed at curbing Israel's spiraling inflation. The protests were touched off by the announcement on Nov. 19 of the measures which are expected to produce a deliberate slowdown in the economy and austerity affecting every Israeli home. The Hurwitz plan calls for a tight credit squeeze and a halt in government development projects, including new schools and hospitals. Milk and milk products were targeted for 100 percent

increases; public transport 50 percent; electricity nearly 40 percent; and mail service 30 percent. An imminent oil price increase is expected to trigger a new chain of price increases. Hurwitz defended the program in a TV interview in which he said "another nation could live on the amount of money we waste." He warned the current 100 percent inflation rate would not decline in the first two to three months of the new economic program.

Declaring that Israel's annual balance of trade deficit stands at \$4.3 billion, Hurwitz said the program will "freeze" "greatly swollen" services. Credit "which is fueling inflation," will be allowed to rise by only nine percent in the next three months. He said government subsidies "have been completely abolished for milk and milk products and for cooking oil and will soon be abolished for meat." He said there will be "no new wage agreements until 1981," interpreted to mean that wage agreements coming up for renewal in 1980 will be extended unchanged for a year. His economic "war cabinet" met for seven hours before issuing


