Wiesenthal, who heads the Nazi war crimes documentation center in Vienna, claimed that the Chilean government is well aware of Mengele's presence but so far has refused to respond to an extradition request from the West German government. He said he had learned from three independent sources that Mengele fled to Chile after the government of Paraguay revoked his citizenship last August. Paraguay apparently acted after warrants for Mengele's arrest were issued by West German embassies through Latin America. Dekel, however, contends that Mengele is still in Paraguay.

In a second letter to Carter week, the New York Congresswoman described the White House reply, signed by NSC Staff Secretary Christine Dodson as "inappropriate, inadequate and inaccurate." her original In letter to Carter, Holtzman pointed out that Trifa, who is Bishop of the Rumanian Orthodox Church in the U.S. and a naturalized American citizen. is alleged to have incited atrocities against Jews in Bucharest during World War II. The broadcast interview made no mention of the fact that the Justice Department initiated denaturalization proceedings against Trifa in May, 1975 and that trial of his case is pending in Federal court in Detroit.

Top officials of the U.S. Board for International Broadcasting, which oversees Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty, subsequently deplored the interview and expressed regret that it was broadcast. But at a board meeting last August 15, Henze characterized concern over the interview as "silly" and claimed was presenting "the White House position on this issue." In that connection he noted that "Bishop

Trifa, as an American citizen, represents an important ethnic group."

In her reply to Holtzman, Dodson that Henze's said "personal estimate of the importance of the Trifa broadcan be justicast fiably contested by others" but that he had "explicitly shared the view" that the broadcast was an "error of judgement" and "nowhere in the discussion did he either support this broadcast or indicate. even in the slightest, any sympathy for Archbishop Trifa's alleged past activities." Taking issue with that response, Holtzman stated in her letter to the President that it #does not indicate whether Mr. Henze's remarks represent the position of, or were sanctioned by, the White House as he so stated at the August 15 meeting." She said response was "inaccurate because it does not in any way reflect the verbatim transcript" of the August 15 meeting. She noted that Henze has "steadfastly refused to retract his comments despite pleas from several participants in the meeting

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- The controversial amendment to the abortion law passed first reading by a vote of 58 - 53 and nine abstentions absences. The government coalition was therefore spared the threat of the Aguda Israel Knesset faction that it would leave coalition and as i result endanger the coalition majority.

After the vote. Aguda faction leader Shlomo Lorinez said had been "a victory for common sense and Jewish morality." Aguda's threat to leave the coalition. was not lifted, he said, since coalition and Premier Menachem Begin himself had proven that they sincerelysought to maintain the coalition agreement signed with Aguda to amend the abortions law.

The voting was on a compromise formula eliminated which clause five of the abor-

tion law which permits abortions for socio - economic reasons, meaning mothers of poverty families with large numbers of children, and expanded clause four of the law to include some of the cases covered by clause five. The new language was left vague and open to broad interpretations. Clause four permits abortions on "danger grounds of to the woman's life" or "severe physical or mental damage" resulting from continued pregnancy.

The compromise added the words, "or such (damage) as is caused by a difficult milieu of family circumstances that find no other solution." Prior to the voting. Begin had declared the vote one of confidence in the government. Had the amendment not been passed, the government may well have been forced to resign.
