

MILITANTS DEMANI WEIZMAN RESIGN

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- Beefed - up Israeli police and troops in full battle gear patrolled the West Bank following the terrorist ambush in Hebron May which left six dead -- all of them yeshiva students -- and 16 wounded. The terrorists fired automatic weapons and hurled hand grenades as the group of Orthodox young people were heading from Friday night services at the Cave of Machpela Synagogue at the Tomb of the Patriarchs toward the old Hadassah building in Hebron.

Security authorities believe that the terrorists are not infiltrators but West Bank residents since they discovered locally - made cigarette butts at the ambush site. The Palestine Liberation Organization in Beirut claimed responsibility for the outrage.

Three of those killed were from the United States and Canada: Zvi Menachem Glatt, 21, of New York; Eli Hazeev (Wolf) 32, believed

They say imitation is the sincerest form of flattery.

If so, our Uncle Joe, who passed away last week at 67, was flattered all his life.

And he loved it.

A learned man, Uncle Joe read books from Shakespeare to Scarne. He is survived by his mother Bessie, sisters Bea and Dorothy, brother Sy, brother - in - law Bill, and a multitude of nieces, nephews, relatives and friends.

Our dear, loveable Uncle Joe. No one ever disliked him.

He was a lawyer for more than four decades. A heart of gold. Every client became his friend.

At his eulogy, Rabbi Sidney Nissenbaum recalled how "his friend" Joe did not die of heart failure, despite what the doctors say, because his heart never failed anyone. His generosity and sensitivity touched all of our lives.

Joe never married, the good Rabbi continued, but he was in every sense a family man. At his funeral, family came from near and as far as 3,000 miles. Not out of any sense of duty, but simply because we all loved Uncle Joe. He is now pleading a case before a jury some-
