

## Will They Love Us Tomorrow?

American Jews have become used to candidates during election years, particularly Presidential years, vowing their support for Israel. This traditional display was starkly dramatized at the recent 21st annual policy conference of the American Israel Public Affairs Committee (AIPAG) in Washington, where two candidates and three spokesmen for candidates all voiced their support for Israel's security. It was put into perspective by one of the participants, Ray Cline, speaking for George Bush, who said: "we all love AIPAC and Israel.'

This "love" sometimes vanishes when the candidate gets into office. British Jews have even a longer experience, dating back to the Mandate period. British opposition parties were strongly Zionist. They became pro-Arab when

they controlled the government.

In the United States, American policy has been to support Israel's survival. This is a policy of both parties and it is also a policy strongly backed by the American people. But it has also been a policy of the U.S. to try to win friends among the Arabs and especially to keep Saudi Arabia happy since it is our chief supplier of oil.

The differences among Presidents and wouldbe Presidents come down to how they will carry out this general policy, where their priorities are. President Carter has an established record on the Middle East. Supporters of Israel will have to decide what weighs more, his positive accomplishments or the negative aspects of his policy. The other candidates will have to demonstrate by specific proposals how they will deal with the Mideast. They will also be judged

The Jewish community should go on record as letting candidates know, "Sure we know you love us, but we want to know specifically what you will do and we plan to hold you to those

promises.'

Catholic priests and Bishops have stood out as valiant champions of Israeli statehood and have voiced their strongly pro - Jewish views in the pulpits, in the press and in books,

Most outstanding among these trusted friends of Israel and Jewry has been Father Drinan who, upon notification of the order, issued a statement which opened with these telling words: "It is with regret and pain that I accept the decision of the Holy See ...

While Pope John Paul II's decree ordered all priests to stay out of politics, it appears to your correspondent that it, the decree itself, is political in its very nature, since it serves to silence all those honest Catholics who have spoken out boldly on behalf of Israel's right to sovereignty over the land of the Prophets

including Jerusalem.

The Vatican decree, it appears, was aimed specifically at American priests whose voices in the U.S. carried much weight with the electorate, more particularly the voice of Rep. Drinan in Congress. It may well be that Father Drinan was the main target of this latest Vatican action. He not only proved himself a staunch champion of the Jewish State. He also placed the root causes of the Holocaust in Christianity. Refusing to remain silent on these issues, he opened his heart in a book published by Doubleday in 1977.
