JEWISH NEWS BRIEFS

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Jewish emigration from the Soviet Union fell to the lowest level of 1980 in May when only 1,976 Jews reached Vienna. According to the Student Struggle for Soviet Jewry and Union of Councils for Soviet Jews, this was 52 percent below last year's monthly average.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- The House of Representatives voted 221 - 147 to send to the Senate foreign aid legislation authorizing \$2.18 billion in military and economic aid to Israel. It also authorized \$1.3 billion for Egypt and \$16 million for development and training programs for the West Bank and Gaza Strip. Funds for Syria were rejected.


BONN (WNS) -- The West German government has decided not to ban Japanese - made toys bearing Nazi symbols. However, the importer, a Nuremburg firm, promised to stop distributing the toys which have been sold in stores throughout West Germany although, according to authorities, not in great quantities.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- An organized group of South Africans have arrived in Israel for the first time. The group of 77 persons, included 20 priests and one hishop. Black South Africans, usually students or artists, have previously visited Israel as individuals.

BONN (WNS) -- Member of the ruling Social Democratic Party parliamentary faction has published a statement favoring the continuation of the peace process in the Middle East based on the Camp David accords. The statement also opposed any change to United Nations Security Council Resolution 242.

TEL AVIV (WNS) -- An Israeli raiding party attacked terrorist targets in the port of Sidon in south Lebanon and returned safely to its base, an army spokesman announced today. A number of terrorists were killed or wounded in the operation.





LONDON (WNS) -- Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko sternly rebuffed Swedish Foreign Minister Ola Ullsten when the Swedish official attempted to raise the issue of Raol Wallenberg, the wartime diplomat missing in the Soviet Union for 35 years. Swedish officials here said Gromyko replied "coldly and unmoved," firmly restating the Soviet position that Wallenberg died in 1947 despite at least 14 reported sightings subsequently in Soviet prisons.

WASHINGTON (WNS) -- The American Jewish Press Association (AJPA) will hold its 38th annual meeting here to be attended by the editors and publishers of some 75 English - language Jewish weekly, bi - weekly and monthly news-papers in the United States and Canada. A highlight of the three - day gathering will be a threehour briefing at the White House to be followed by a press conference with President Carter, it was announced by Frank F. Wundohl, editor of the Jewish Exponent of Philadelphia, who is the AJPA's president.

A company spokesman said the airliner had agreed to pay Murray Schwartz, of Encino, Calif. \$7,500 of the \$1.5 million he claimed in damages in his suit charging Air France with negligence in allowing the terrorist hijackers to board the plane.
