PAUL MAY: 14-YEAR VETERAN



PAUL

Speaker of the Assembly Paul May announced he will seek reelection to the North Las Vegas Assembly seat he has held for 14 years.

May, 52, ranks second among Nevada's 40 assemblymen in seniority. He was first elected in 1966.

Elected by his fellow Democratic assemblymen to the powerful position of Speaker in 1979, May presided over the last legislative session in the Assembly's top leadership position.

"I was thrilled and humbled by being elected Speaker," May said. "The responsibilities of the job were many and varied, and I spent the session working as hard and as well as I could to meet the challenges of the speakership."

May said, however,

that he would not seek the position again for the legislative session beginning in January. "The Nevada Assembly is extremely fortunate to have a number of outstanding, respected and experienced leaders," May said. "We have many men and women thoroughly prepared to assume the leadership positions, and I believe it is time to vest these responsibilities in them."

May, who represents Assembly District 19, served as chairman of the Taxation Committee from 1973 to 1977. He has also served as vice chairman of the Government Affairs Committee and on the Labor and Management Committee Fish and Game Committee, Natural Resources Committee and Judiciary Committee.

Presently May is a member of the powerful Legislative Commission and the interim study committee on taxation.

May has sponsored successful legislation to locate the Clark County Community College in North Las Vegas, to annex Rancho High School to North Las Vegas and has opposed efforts to consolidate North

JACK JEFFERY SEEKS POST

Assemblyman Jack Jeffrey, chairman of the Commerce Committee announced he will seek reelection to the Assembly District 22 seat he has held since 1974.

District 22 includes the southern portion of Henderson, Boulder City, Laughlin, Goodsprings, Jean, and Moapa and Virgin Valleys.

Jeffrey, who compiled a 100 per cent voting and attendance record in the 1977 and 1979 sessions of the legislature, said his

"We passed the largest tax relief package in state history, along with some badly-needed tough criminal laws and enactment of generic drug legislation. We took some big strides in protecting the expanding of our fish and game and recreation programs. We increased the opportunities for veterans housing, reformed the bail bond laws, raised the limits for which a business person or consumer can sue in small claims court, maintained our traditional policy of fiscal integrity and budget surpluses and voted to conduct a number of very important interim studies of issues between the 1979 and 1981 sessions of the legislature."

May said challenges facing the 1981 legislature would include reapportionment, dealing with the problems of rapid growth and development, transportation and roads, criminal justice "and a possible threat to our revenues based on possible uncertain and trying times which could affect our tourist industry.

May lives with his wife, Lucille, at 3309 Wright Avenue. They have three children, Paul III resident of Elko, Sandra and April.

"most important accomplishment for my district during the 1979 legislature" was helping to gain approval of \$1.9 million to build a community college campus in Henderson.

Named majority whip during the 1977 legislature, Jeffrey served on the Government Affairs Committee in 1979. He previously served on the Agriculture Committee and Environment and Natural Resources Committee.

The 41-year-old Henderson Democrat supported tax reduction legislation during the last legislative session as well as generic drug authorization and bail bond reform. He also voted for three new anti-crime bills, and said "even tougher criminal laws must be examined by the legislature in 1981.

Jeffrey has lived in Henderson for 39 years. He served as councilman and was unanimously elected mayor pro tem.

He lives with his wife Betty at 340 Chaparral Drive. They have three children.

SAM BOWLER SEEKS REELECTION

Clark County Commission Chairman Sam Bowler announced he will seek reelection in Commission District "D."

Bowler was elected to the board of county commissioners four years ago. He was elected chairman of the board in 1979.

The 37-year-old Democrat served as the first chairman of the McCarran Airport Committee in 1978.

He cited major accomplishments in the last four years in expanding aviation facilities.

In addition to his duties as commission chairman, Bowler is chairman of the Clark County Regional Planning Council. He was Chairman of the

Bond Commission in 1978. Besides serving as a Memorial Hospital trustee, he is on the board of trustees of the Las Vegas Valley Water District and the Clark County Sanitation District. He is a former Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Commissioner.

He and his wife Jannalane, have three children.
