WILL DEISS: INCUMBENT CONSTABLE ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY

Will Deiss was appointed the Constable for Las Vegas by the Clark County Commission in July 1979. He was picked from over 35 applicants for that position when the Commissioners decided to keep the office in tact instead of under the jurisdiction of the Sheriff and the Las Vegas Police Department.

The office is open from 7 to 5, Monday through Friday, with deputies working through Saturday and around the clock, if necessary. Deiss began his Police career with the Las Vegas Police Department in 1953, where he served for over 20 years working as a Jailer, Police Dispatcher, Foot Patrolman, Uniform Police Patrol Car and Detective. He worked many years in the Burglary Detail and was one of the founders of the

Southern Nevada Burglary Conference.

In 1973 with the merger of the Metro Police Department, he served six years with that department working in the Uniform Patrol and the Detective Bureau where he worked in the Larceny and Fugitive Details and finishing his career in the Crime Prevention Bureau. He resigned his commission in July 1979 to accept the appointment of Constable of Las Vegas, thus completing 27 years in Law Enforcement. Deiss is quite active

in local community affairs. He is the past President of the Las Vegas Police Officers Assn. where he served as its President for 10 consecutive terms. He also serves as Vice President of the International Union of Police where he is now serving his eighth consecutive term. Vice President of the Southern Nevada Constables and Lawmans Assn. He is a member of the Nevada Peace Officers and has served as its Legislative Chairman for many years, Nevada Constables Assn., The International Police Officers Assn., Nevada (COPS).

Deiss is a past President of the Breakfast Exchange Club and now serves as its Assistant Director representing the Exchange Club in California, Nevada and Hawaii. The Clubs main function is helping abused children. He is also a member of the American Legion, Post 55; Saints and Sinners, Kentucky Colonels and The Elks Club.

Deiss was appointed to the Nevada State Retirement Board in 1977 by Governor Mike O'Callaghan to represent Police Officers and Firemen in matters of pension and disability. He represents Nevada on the National Retirement Board for Public Employees.

He has attended schools at California State University, University of Nevada, California Poly and Western Illinois.

NICK HORN TO RUN FOR THIRD TERM SPRINGER FILES FOR SUPREME COURT

Assemblyman Nick Horn, chairman of the Elections Committee, announced he will seek reelection to a third term in the legislature.

Horn, 35, was first elected to represent District 15 in 1976. He was elected "Outstanding Freshman Assemblyman" in 1977.

During both of his legislative sessions, Horn compiled a 100 per cent voting and attendance record.

In the 1979 session, Horn served on the Commerce Committee and Judiciary Committee in addition to chairing the Elections Committee. He also served on the Select Committee on Ethics.

During his first term he was vice chairman of the Education Committee and served on the Taxation Committee and Elections Committee.

KAREN HAYES PROPOSES 3 NEW LAWS

Assemblyman Karen Hayes, chairman of the Judiciary Committee announced she will seek reelection to her fourth term as representative of District 13. Hayes said the most significant work of her Judiciary Committee "was the successful recommendation to the legislature of three tough new criminal laws to fight rising crime in Nevada."

The three new laws, she said, increase the prison time a criminal must serve before being eligible for parole, double the penalty for crimes against the elderly or blind and prohibit probation for major crimes involving a deadly weapon.

The Las Vegas Democrat is the widow of District Court Judge Keith Hayes. She lives with her children at 6010 Euclid Avenue.

Democrat also sponsored the successful legislation which prohibits the "blacking out" of televised Nevada sporting events, provided the event is sold out 24 hours in advance.

Horn also cited as 1981 legislative challenges "better transportation and better roads, a clear definition of nuclear waste disposal policy, continued general fund support for Nevada fish and game programs and the always critical goal of integrity in government."

He presently represents Nevada on the Government and Finance Committee of the Western Council of State Governments. He also serves on the Interim Study Committee on Juvenile Alcohol and Drug Abuse and the Interim Committee studying the Nevada Public Service Commission.

Horn teaches business management at the Clark County Community College.

He and his wife, Nancy, have two children. They reside at 2543 Boise Street.

Former Attorney General Charles E. Springer, 52, active as a judicial educator, teaching judges from throughout the country while also presiding over the Washoe County Juvenile Court, announced that he will file as a candidate for the Nevada Supreme Court.

This second generation Nevadan and past president of the National Council of Juvenile Court Judges Associates said his decision was "founded on a sincere belief that I have now reached a stage in my legal and judicial career at which I am best

suited to serve my state in the critically important office of Supreme Court Justice."

On his candidacy for Supreme Court, Springer, a veteran trial lawyer, emphasized his belief that "the job of a Supreme Court Justice is to interpret and apply the existing laws and not make new ones, and a good justice will do just that.

He and his wife, Jacqueline, a native of Ely, have one daughter, Kelli, and currently reside in Reno.

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
