

GENERAL ASSEMBLY WANTS ISRAEL TO WITHDRAW

UNITED NATIONS (WNS) -- A resolution demanding that Israel start by Nov. 15 to withdraw from all territories occupied since the 1967 Six Day War, "including Jerusalem" was adopted by the General Assembly by a vote of 112-7 with 24 abstentions.

The United States, Israel, Canada, Australia, Norway, Guatemala and the Dominican Republic voted against the resolution which reaffirmed the right of the Palestinian people "to establish its own independent sovereign state."

The same countries, except for Norway and the Dominican Republic, also voted against a companion resolution calling on the General Assembly's Committee on the Inalienable Rights of the Palestinian People to study why Israel has not complied with past UN resolutions dealing with the Arab-Israeli conflict. That resolution was adopted by a vote of 112-5 with 26 abstentions. The voting ended the emergency special session of the General Assembly on the Palestinian question during which nearly 100 countries spoke during six days of de-

bate.

Just before the vote the main resolution was amended at the request of Fallou Kane of Senegal, chairman of the Palestinian committee, to declare that "Israel should fully comply with all UN resolutions relevant to the historic character of the holy city of Jerusalem." Yehuda Blum, Israel's Ambassador to the UN, objected noting that the introduction of an amendment at that time violated Assembly rules. But he did not demand a vote saying he knew very well how the outcome would be in the Assembly.

HOUSTON COMPANY VIOLATES ANTI-BOYCOTT

WASH. (WNS) -- Kintetsu World Express, Inc., of Houston, Texas, an air freight forwarder, has been charged by the U.S. Department of Commerce with violating federal laws prohibiting support for the Arab boycott of Israel by discriminating against American companies doing business with Israel or managed by American Jews.

Kintetsu, a wholly-

owned subsidiary of Kinetsu World Express Inc., of Tolyo, is charged with supplying "negative statements of origin" in making 19 shipments of U.S. manufactured goods, principally oil drilling equipment from Houston to Egypt and Kuwait.

The Commerce Department said the company certified that the goods origi-

nated in the U.S. "and not Israel, nor did the raw materials used in their manufacture originate in Israel."
