NEW YORK -- Every New Year, the sounds of the Shofar have been heard in Bikur Cholim Hospital in Jerusalem since the 1850's, but come this Rosh Hashanah, it will be the first time heard in the recently built Florence Miller Pediatric Neurology Diagnostic Unit as well as in the new Emergency Room Pavilion. "The Shofar must certainly sound for the children as well as the adults," said Rabbi Chaskel Besser, president of the American Association for Bikur Cholim Hospital.

The new Florence Miller unit is one of the outstanding clinics and treatment centers for brain damaged children in Israel and the Middle East and was built as an infection free wing. It is separated from the general pediatric ward by a sun - filled bridge.

There are about 400 beds in Bikur Cholim Hospital which is the only hospital within the confines of the City of Jerusalem proper, and which serves people from the communities of Beulah, Mea Shearim, the Bukharian Quarter, Sanhedria, Machaneh Yehudah, in crowded downtown Jerusalem and beyond.

Also, for the first time on the terraces of the Florence Miller Pediatric Neurology Diagnostic Unit, the flowers which will be blooming in honor of the season of the New Year are pomegranates.
