

### COMMITTEE ENDORSES CONTROL OF JERUSALEM

NOTRE DAME, IND. (WNS) -- The 23 North American members of Mayor Teddy Kollek's Jerusalem Committee have endorsed Israel's administration of Jerusalem and Kollek's effort toward unity and universal access to the city. The committee, meeting for two days at the University of Notre Dame, also supported the Jerusalem Mayor's plan for autonomous governing units within the many cultural and religious communities in Jerusalem. The meeting here was the first ever held by the committee outside Jerusalem and the first where North American members met separately.

In an address to the committee, Kollek declared that the recent threats by Arab leaders to "liberate" Jerusalem did not disturb him. "It's not the first time," he said. "But Arabs in Jerusalem are the most civilized, best educated of any in the world, and they don't want to see their city divided any more than the Jews." Kollek stressed that in the 13 years Jerusalem has been united "there is more tolerance.. than there has ever been." He said that during the 19 years Jordan ruled East Jerusalem "Christians and Jews weren't allowed to visit their holy places; there was no free Christian education; 58 synagogues were destroyed. Now the holy places are meticulously taken care of; Arabs are allowed the citizenship they desire and the education system they want. Each religion administers its own holy places; there

is free access to the Arab countries and everyone can participate in the local democratic elections.

Father Theodore Heshburgh, president of Notre Dame, and a member of the Jerusalem Committee, contrasted the tranquility of Jerusalem with the tension and armed conflicts elsewhere in the Middle East. Stating the consensus of the committee, he declared; "I believe that any person of good will fully acquainted with the facts of the situation and with the ways in which Jerusalem now lives, thrives, and is administered, will join me in recognizing that the progress made by Mayor Teddy Kollek and his administration holds the promise of enabling Jerusalem to fulfill its historic role as the 'City of Peace'."

### U.S. BACKS ISRAEL IN UN VOTE

GENEVA (WNS) -- The United Nations Human Rights Commission adopted a resolution condemning Israel's policies in the occupied territories and accusing it of "war crimes that are an affront to humanity." The vote was 31-3 with eight abstentions. The United States, Canada and Australia voted against the resolution with most West European countries abstaining.

### REAGAN ASKED TO PROSECUTE NAZIS

WASH. (WNS) -- President Reagan has been asked by 104 members of the House from both parties to budget \$3 million to continue the prosecution of 18 cases against alleged Nazi war criminals living in the United States which are now before the courts and 210 other cases being investigated.

In a letter to Reagan, the Congressman noted that the investigations are under a special unit of the Office of Special Investigations in the Criminal Division of the Justice Department. The letter, initiated by Reps. William Lehman (D. Fla.)

and Hamilton Fish, Jr. (R.N.Y.), said that the proceedings are being directed "by an extremely competent and dedicated attorney, Allan Ryan."

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### LOOK FOR JEWISH MINDS

The Reagan Administration, which is concentrating on domestic issues, should not overlook the expertise that is available in the organized Jewish community. This is especially true of the many American Jewish organizations which deal with issues that concern not only Jews alone but all Americans.

Organizations like the American Jewish Committee, the American Jewish Congress, the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith and the National Jewish Community Relations Advisory Council, as well as others too numerous to name, all deal with the entire gamut of problems this country faces. Whether it is the economy, the major concern now of the Administration; social problems, energy, urban affairs, the separate concerns of the aged and the young, crime, what have you, the Jewish community can offer up some of the most sage advice to be found in the United States.

Nor should the Jewish community be tapped for advice alone. There are men and women who can make important contributions to the new government. Here, especially, women should be mentioned. The Reagan Administration appears to be having trouble finding women to name to office. Perhaps this is because, like the Carter Administration which had a good record on appointing women, it seems to restrict its search to the business and professional world, academic and government itself.

Yet, as we in the Jewish community know so well, some of the most talented women are at work in the voluntary organizations of the Jewish community. Too often these organizations have been overlooked in the search for talent. Jewish women have a long record of administering -- and administering well -- some of the largest organizations not only in the Jewish world but in the United States itself. And these organizations have long been concerned with the type of problems that are on top of our national agenda.
