The Vatican and the PLO

It gets morally curiouser and curiouser at

Vatican City these days. When Aldo Moro, the distinguished Italian Christian Democratic leader was brutally murdered by the terrorist Red Brigade in Italy, Pope John Paul vigorously condemned violence and terrorism as an assault on the sanctity of human life and as a threat to civic peace. Similarly, the Pope and Vatican authorities rightly condemned violence in Ireland, Lebanon, in South America and elsewhere as criminal behavior.

Then, on March 18, the Vatican Secretary of State, Cardinal Casaroli, received a PLO delegation headed by Farouk Kadoumi, the most intransigent and rejectionist of PLO leaders. While the PLO requested the meeting, the Vatican decision to meet with this out-law group cannot but have the effect of legitimizing terrorists and murderers of civilian men, women and children.

Mil'ions of thoughtful people everwhere must be asking themselves how the Vatican reconciles its many fervent condemnations of terrorism as a sin against God and man and at the same time throws this mantle of sanctity over the foremost terrorist group in the world today. As the major scholars of terrorism have documented, the PLO with the convivance of the Soviet Union is the hub of an international network of some 140 terrorist groups in 50 countries who are determined to undermine democratic governments.
