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point peace plan. Its formula consisted of: 1. A total cease - fire of all forces including the guerrillas of the PLO.

Restoration of Lebanese governmental sovereignty over its entire territory and the establishment of full control and jurisdiction.

3. Internationally - supervised elections for a constituent assembly to draft a new constitution.

4. Non - intervention from outside into the internal affairs of Lebanon.

5. Withdrawal of all foreign forces and foreign military installations including the socalled Syrian peace - keeping force.

6. Disarmament of all para - military

organizations, such as the PLO.

7. Opening of peace negotiations between Israel and Lebanon under UN resolutions 242 and 338.

Having presented this formula, Ambassador Rafael noted that Lebanon, which has no territorial problems with Israel, has always maintained that it wanted peace with Israel but did not want to be the first Arab country to negotiate directly with the Jewish state. "That pretext doesn't hold anymore," Rafael declared, referring to the Egyptian peace treaty with Israel.

He did not believe that war would erupt at the present time.

In concluding his fascinating book, Rafael discusses an encounter he had with Moshe Dayan

on the question of the Camp David accords. "When we met again at the end of March 1978, on the eve of my retirement," he writes, "the negotiations with Egypt had come to a standstill. The positions of the two sides was diametrically opposed on the Palestinian issue. That spring the Israeli government had rejected as heresy texts which in the autumn it had accepted at Camp David as binding policy. Dayan asked me whether I believed in the sincerety of Sadat's intentions. I answered that I would advise respect for him for his audacious initiative and his proclaimed peaceful intentions and tive in the Middle East

suspicion of him until he gave convincing proof of his readiness to achieve peace by mutual accommodation.

"I asked what was to happen next. 'How would I know, growled Dayan, rocking in his ministerial swivel - chair. 'I wouldn't even know how much longer I'll occupy this seat.' By some awful swivelling he held on to it for another eighteen months. When he eventually resigned in November 1979 the discussions between Israel and Egypt on the establishment of full autonomy for the inhabitants of the West Bank and the Gaza area, as envisaged in the Camp David agreement, had reached a complete impasse. Realizing that his original hypothesis -- the acceptance of Israel's rule over Judea. Samaria and Gaza for the return of Sinai to Egypt -- did not work, he withdrew from the scene. In our talk, Dayan was obviously disinclined to discuss the state of the stalled peace negotiations. He had some amiable words in connection with my retirement intimating that he himself longed for that blissful state of freedom from bondage. ..'

In an answer to a question on the autonomy plan, he noted that whatever "measures to be taken during the five years specified may allow a period for the furnishing of a 'waiting room' in preparation for the 'living - room' -- all depending on global developments."

The report is based on the experts conference on anti-Semitism held in Amsterdam at the end of March, and was discussed at a meeting of the AJC's Foreign Affairs Commission chaired by Rita Hauser, the Commission's chairperson.


