BRITAIN CALLS FOR BETTER RELATIONS

LONDON (WNS) --Douglas Hurd, Foreign Office Minister said he of State, hoped relations would improve between Israel and Britain. regardless of who becomes the new Israeli Prime Minister, and called a a "new chapter" in Britain-Israeli relations it was reported here.

Referring to the Israeli elections, Hurd expressed the hope that the next government could pursue "a clear line of policy, and I expect will happen. that Speaking just the day after Britain assumed the six - month presidency of the European Economic Community (EEC) Hurd added that the 10 member countries would pursue the EEC peace initiative "without respite.

He added that the EEC's policy was and "not yet fined and sought to keep closely to exist, he said.

Hurd said that there was still no plans for Lord Carrington, current chairman of the EEC, to meet with Palestine Liberation Leader Yasir Arafat. However, it remained a possibility within the framework of the Euro - Arab dialogue later in the vear. Looking forward to what Hurd termed "close and frank relations" with Iswith Israel he suggested that relations could have been better over the past year had Israel reacted differently to the EEC's Venice Declaration initiative, calling for mutual recognition by Israel and the Palestinians.

WHY ISRAEL IS RETALIATING

TEL AVIV (WNS) -Palestinian terrorists launched a Katyusha rocket attack from Lebanon on the coastal resort of Nahariya killing three people and wounding 13. Rockets fired by the terrorists also wounded 12 people in the border town of Kirvat Shemona. Both towns also sustained severe property damage and crops in settlements between the two towns. were set afire by rockets.

The attacks were described as the heaviest since the Yom Kippur War by Israeli military sources. United Nations sources said nearly 300 rockets were lobbed into northern Israel's towns

Israel retaliated the next day as it carried out its heaviest attack in recent years on Palestinian bases in Lebanon. Accord-ing to a military spokesman five brid-

Deputy Defense Minister Mordechai Zipori said recently that Israel would step up its anti - terrorist activities in south Lehanon in view of reports that the terrorists have acquired sophisticated arms from Libya, Syria and the Soviet Union. MACCABIAH "BLACKOUT"

The third largest international athletic competition in the world, the llth Maccabiah Games have taken place in Israel and if you watch. listen or read sports news, you might be under the impression that sports news ceases when the "Boys of Summer" take to the picket lines The coverage in the general press of this most important and festive sports event in Israel has been slim and in some cases non - existent.

The Games featured a total of 3500 athletes with a delegation of nearly 400 representing the United States. Athletes from 35 countries competed in the Games that highlighted 31 sports. from basketball to swimming and chess to bridge. It was a long way from the first Maccabiah in 1932 which lasted just two days and drew about 25,000 fans.

The opening ceremonies for this year's Games, which cost a reportedly \$3,2 million to mount, found an enthusiastic crowd of 50,000 sports fans watching Shlomo Glickstein, Israel's top seeded tennis champ, race into the Ramat Gan Stadium bearing the traditional Maccabiah torch which had been kindled earlier in Modi'in, birthplace of the Maccabees.

Whatever the reasons for this U.S. media blackout of the Maccabiah Games, we can only suggest that the tide should change. The athletes from the United States could do with some added exposure as can the viewers with quality and quantitive sports. Baseball will no doubt continue, as it has for a century, as the most popular summer sport in the U.S. despite the progress and final outcome of the baseball strike.

But when Sunday afternoon sports programing brings Triple A minor league baseball from Omaha, Nebraska or a tug - of - war between the Steel Workers Union and Mine Workers Union of Pittsburgh into our living room, "the thrill of victory and the agony of defeat" has been demoted as compared to the international sporting spirit of the Maccabiah Games. There is no baseball in the Maccabiah Games. However, this summer continues in the United States for a sports hungry audience deprived of good competitive athletic drama The 11th Maccabiah provided this outlet.

He would offer one portfolio each to the Tami and La'am factions.

TEL AVIV (WNS) --A military court in Nablus ruled that it was competent to try four Arabs for the murder of six Israeli Jews and the wounding of 16 others in an ambush of worshippers on their way home from synagogue in Hebron in May 1980.

The defense had claimed the court had no right to try them as the four were "prisoners of war." The judges refused to allow a delay until the defense appeals to the Supreme Court, but noted the defense lawyers could still do so. The four Arabs refused to cooperate with the court. When asked whether they understood the charges against them which carry a death sentence, they refused to reply. laughing loudly instead and Palestine shouting Liberation Organization slogans.
