CEASE-FIRE WAS VIOLATED SAYS BEGIN

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Israel reserved the right to continue aerial reconnaissance flights over Lebanon when it agreed to the cease-fire and the flights will continue, Premier Menachem Begin told the Knesset's Foreign Affairs and Security Committee. He said the United States was fully aware of this position. The flights are described as non - combat reconnaissance to monitor any Palestinian build - up of weapons indicating preparations to renew hostilities against Israel.

These non - combat flights however, resulted in the downing of a Syrian MIG-25 interceptor during a brief dogfight north of Beirut. A military spokesman said the Israeli aircraft over Lebanon were on a routine monitoring flight when the Syrians interfered. All Israeli planes returned safely to their bases he said. Meanwhile, a Syrian spokesman claimed that Israeli spy planes would be shot down over Lebanon. Begin noted that "it is easier said than done be-

The police department in Dayton, Ohio, meets secretly for six months to plan a work stoppage. On D-day 16 officers complain of bunion problems and cannot report to work. Twenty-four others have hanging cuticles while thirty-three more have ingrown toenail troubles. All detectives, officers assigned to patrol car units and beat patrolmen report assorted health ailments that force them to stay home. The plan works, but the town dies. Bands of teenage gangs roam the streets and control the city. Thugs take over city hall the banks, businesses and transportation systems.

Well, the police have made their point. They work for mediocre dollars, put in long hours of dedicated duty and are subjected to the every-day dangers associated with their job. Sounds absurd?

Look what the PATCO (Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization) folks are doing to our country. They are sworn civil servants obliged to obey a no - strike oath signed when they were himed by the Federal Aviation Agency.

Yet, they walked out not caring about the overall safety of airplane travelers all over the country. Not caring about the crippling economic effects they were causing major U.S. cities, airlines and related business and tourist interests.

Sure they walk the picket lines with their children complaining of working forty hours of tension - packed duty every week. Sure their job causes early burn - out, alcholism and domestic disputes.
