

SADAT SAYS

meeting with President Reagan. But he noted that he did not expect an "immediate answer" from Reagan and said he thought it was "fair" to wait until Reagan meets with Premier Menachem Begin in September.

On other issues, Sadat said that Egypt will not allow the U.S. to use the two air bases Israel is vacating in the Sinai although it has offered the U.S. the use of bases all over Egypt. He said his reasons for this is that "I don't want any shade of doubt" that the Sinai is being turned over to Egypt. He denied that he had any apprehension that Israel would not complete its final withdrawal from the Sinai by April 1982 as scheduled in the Camp David agreement.

Sadat said that in his meetings with congressional members here, he urged them to approve the proposed sale of AWACs reconnaissance aircraft to Saudi Arabia as a means of not only safeguarding Saudi Arabia but the whole region as well. He revealed that because of the threat Egypt feels from 60 Soviet MIG-25's in Libya the U.S. provided one of the four AWACs now stationed in Saudi Arabia to safeguard his recent visit to the Sudan.

Meanwhile, Sadat met with 13 Jewish leaders and according to Howard Squadron, chairman of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations, Sadat said that the cease fire between Israel and the Palestinians in Lebanon was "a turning point" and a clear indication that the Palestinian movement has decided to accept responsibility and move in a new direction. Squadron said Sadat urged that Israel and the United States should build on the cease fire in Lebanon and deal directly with the PLO.

However, Squadron said, "We told him that the PLO is a terrorist organization bent on the destruction of Israel and that it should recognize Israel's right to exist first."

Squadron also said that Sadat agreed with the Jewish leaders in the 25 minute

meeting in New York that the conclusion of the autonomy talks for the Palestinians in the West Bank and Gaza Strip is essential to the progress of peace in the region and it should be concluded as soon as possible. Sadat, Squadron said, also agreed that Jerusalem was a separate issue that should be dealt with on a separate basis and not as part of the autonomy negotiations.

The Jewish leaders, headed by Edgar Bronfman, president of the World Jewish Congress told Sadat of their strong opposition to the sale of AWAC reconnaissance planes to Saudi Arabia, explaining that Saudi Arabia is against the Camp David peace process and is one of the major supporters of the PLO. Also attending the meeting was Egyptian Ambassador to the United States Ashraf Ghorbal. The meeting was described as "cordial and warm."

AGREEMENT SIGNED

WASH. (WNS) -- The agreement for a multinational force and observers (MFO) to patrol the Sinai after Israel's final withdrawal in April 1982 was signed here by Israel's Ambassador Ephraim Evron and Egyptian Ambassador Ashraf Ghorbal. The

agreement includes provisions of more than 1,000 troops to the FMO by the United States and getting other nations to make up the rest of the 2,500 member force. Secretary of State Alexander Haig witnessed the signing and noted the "pleasure" the agreement has given both Pre-

sident Reagan and himself adding that the agreement was a "reflection of a new confidence in the Middle East in America's leadership. It's willingness to meet its commitments and obligations to the peace process."
