## LEADERS DISCUSS AWACS

HAPPY NEW YEAR


President Reagan has met with Premier Menachem Begin for the first time. Beyond all the pomp and circumstance, the brass bands from the four armed services and the 19 gun salute, the real meat of the discussions, at least for the President, should have been a lesson in Mideast foreign policy and hopefully a keener understanding into the policies that are formulated in Jerusalem.

The two leaders ran the gamut on issues ranging from the threat of Soviet expansion in in Mideast to the regional strategic consensus which the Administration seeks to obtain, to the long stalled autonomy talks, to continued economic and military assistance to Israel. On these topics. Reagan and Begin seemed to have expressed generally similar views. Begin reminded the President that Israel is a strong ally and Reagan gave assurances to the Israeli Premier of U.S. commitment to Israel's se-

curity. The one issue the two leaders splintered apart on concerned the Administration's proposal to sell AWACS reconnaissance planes to Saudi Arabia. Begin expressed the view that these weapons in the hands of the Saudis are a threat to the security of Israel. Begin said this privately, publicly and surely to other Administration officials and Congressional members during their rounds of talks.

Begin's skepticism of the AWACS package is shared by a large number of members of Congress who will have until late October to veto the proposed sale. The Administration has failed to provide adequate data supportive of the sale where the opposition has continued their assault on the credibility and justification of the package. Begin may just have pro-vided the fuel needed to defeat the weapons sale, but the American Jewish community must continue careful scrutiny as to developments of this proposal. Begin may have presented a worthy case against the sale, but in the final analysis, it is the members of Congress who will make or break the deal.

BONN (WNS) -- The Federal Service for Domestic Security of West Germany reported that Palestine Liberation Organization and Libyan agents have stepped up recruitment efforts of young Arabs and Moslems for military training. The report said that the PLO concentrates its activities primarily in West Berlin, where thousands of young Arabs reside. Most of them come Berlin through East which has a verv cheap air connection to Lebanon. About half of the young Arabs come to West Berlin after having already received some kind of para-military training and political indoctrination in East Berlin.
