BRITISH JEWRY TO ASSIST POLISH JEWS

British Jewry is to provide material assistance to enable 12,000 Jews of Poland to "survive this win-ter" Greville I Greville Janner MP president of the Board of Deputies of British Jews said.

He was speaking after a visit to Poland with his wife as a guest of the Polish Ministry of Religious Affairs. Only apples and potatoes, he said, stood between the Polish people and starvation and British Jewry wanted to help the Jews of Warsaw in the same way that the Caritas organization assumed responsibility for Catholics.

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Prime Minister Menachem Begin and Defense Minister Ariel Sharon issued separate warnings aimed against what they perceive to be mounting pressure from the West for Israeli concessions, a tilt toward the Saudi peace proposal for the region by the European Economic Community (EEC) countries and "confused" American policy towards the Saudi peace

As part of the offensive by Israel against U.S. Administration comments on the Saudi plan, particularly by President Reagan, who said the plan calls for "implicit" recognition of Israel by the Saudis, a point which others say may be interpreted by inference only, Israel dispatched a six member bi - partisan delegation to Washington. The delegation hoped to influence American policy in the Mideast and to explain Israel's position on the Fahd plan and other matters to the Administration, Congress and public opinion. The group is headed by Moshe Arens, the hardline chairman of the Knesset's Foreign Affairs and Security Committee and is composed in equal numbers of Likud and opposition Labor Party MKs.

Saudi Plan Smells

As the old catch phrase goes, if it's not one thing, it's surely to be another. With the AWACS deal put to rest for at least a couple of years until the actual transfer is to begin, the eight point proposal for a Middle East peace issued by Saudi Crown Prince Fahd last August is raising a storm of debate in Washington, in European capitals, back to the House of Saud right to the doors of the Israeli Knesset.

.The Administration is playing the most obstructive role in this debate as it sends crossed signals about the plan andits position on the future of the Camp David accords. The Saudi plan is a half way proposal which is a "peaceful settlement on the terms of the Arab nations and representative of the shortsighted thinking others expect Israel to comply with.

The Fahd plan calls for the total Israeli withdrawal from the occupied territories and the establishment after a few months of UN trusteeship, of a Palestinian state with East Jerusalem as its capital. It would also involve the "dismantlement of Israeli settlemets and "assuring the rights of the Palestinian people and compensating those who do not wish to return to their homeland

The plan reaffirms "the right of all countries in the region to live in peace" and calls for guarantees by "the UN or some of its members" to back up implementation of the plan's principles. When the plan was first proposed in August. Israel flatly rejected it. The late Egyptian President Anwar Sadat said it contained nothing new and the Reagan Administration echoed Sadat's remarks,

Things have apparently changed with the Administration. Reagan speaking jubilantly off the cuff after his AWACS victory, said "the most significant part of (the Fahd plan) is the fact that they (Saudis) recognize Israel as a nation to be negotiated with.' The plan in fact does not call for negotiations with Israel While the plan calls for nations in the area to live in peace, to presumably include Israel, it can
