U.S. PONDERS PALESTINIAN STATE

WASH, (WNS) --The State Department sought to clarify a statement by Secretary of State Alexander Haig who told a Congressional Committee that Saudi Araproposal for bia's a Palestinian State with East Jerusalem as its capital was "especially unacceptable to the United States.

Department spokesman Dean Fischer, responding to reporter's questions, said that while the United States does not advocate the creation of a Palestinian state, it does not rule out that such a state could come into existence through "I don't negotiations. think you have found any United States Administration in that recent years advocated a Palestin-

ian state." Fischer "But said. that does not necessarily mean that it should be ruled out of negotiations. I do not think that any American Administration could put itself in that position."

Fischer denied that flaig s comment meant to imply that the Administration ruled out negotiations. Fischer said that Haig had pointed out that most of the eight point peace plan proposed by Saudi Arabia was unacceptable because it put down conditions that should be = ne-He said gotiated. ilaig was saying that a Palestinian state was "unacceptable unless and until it is negotiated." He added that the peace process is the "appropriate" means for deciding this and other issues.

ISRAEL MAY HAVE TO **REASSESS POSITION**

JERUSALEM (WNS) Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir warned that Israel might have to "reassess its attitude" toward the toward the peace process because of the failure of the West to appreciate Israel's concessions for peace and because of the attitude of the Western countries toward the oilproducing states.

In a major address to a United Jewish Appeal Young Leadership mission in the evening here. Shamir declared that 'Israel has done its duty and contributed more than its share toward a change for the better in the Middle East.' He added: = We have reached even passed. the limits of our concessions, both in the south," a reference to the Sinai, "and in our proposal for full autonomy for the





JERUSALEM (WNS) - The standard of living in Israel rose by 12 percent during the first half of this year, nearly a record. A similar rise was recorded in 1967 after the slump which preceded the Six - Day War.

Details on the changes were disclosed by the Central Bureau of Statistics with publication of the Government's statistical annual.

The data showed contributor to living standard improvement was a rise in the purchase of consumer goods, parti-cularly color TV sets and autos. The rise was attributed to tax cuts on such products implemented by Fi-nance Monister Yoram Aridor and by higher
