
The purpose of the

conference is to launch the Bonds sale drive of 1982 and to con-sult with Israel's leaders on the next stages of the development of the Israeli economy and the role of the Bonds in that process.

Some 432.9 million dollars worth of Bonds were sold last year, bringing the sum total of Israel Bonds sale since 1951 to 5,5 billion dollars.

One of their first trips was at one of the new air bases

constructed in the southern region. The Bonds leaders planted trees at the air base.

WASH. (WNS) --The Reagan Administration has proposed to sell civilian communications equipment to an Arab consortium which includes the Palestine Liberation Organization and Libya, as well as Soviet clients states as Syria and South Yemen but also pro-American states as Egypt and Saudia Arabia. Congress will have 30 days to review the proposal from the date of which it was submitted,

A detailed letter has been sent by the Administration members of Congress

assuring them that the \$79 million deal for the 22 - member ARABSAT consortium did not mean that the U.S. was recognizing the PLO and that the equipment would not be used in an Arab satelite system which might have military capabilities. The deal was pulled back last November in the face of Congressional criticism that the equipment might have military capabilities.
