MOSELY FILES FOR DISTRICT COURT

Judge Donald M. Mosley formally announced his candidacy for District Court, Department 14.

He had previously filed on opening day January 4th, for one of the four new judgeships which he had assisted in obtaining in the Legislature last year.

Mosley, 35, was elected Municipal Court Judge in 1979 after having served several years as prosecutor in the criminal division of the City Attorney's office.

"There are definite changes which must be made in the criminal justice system if we are to gain control of the increasingly severe crime problem in our state," Mosley said. "Among these is the limiting of frequency of use and cope of parole and probation practices. When a criminal is sentenced to 30 years in prison, it is contemplated that he serve 30 years, not 8 or 10 and then be paroled. I feel that the Judge at the time of sentencing is in a much better position

to determine a proper sentence than a parole board reviewing the case 10 years later."

"Other areas of concern," Mosley continued, "are the number of repeat offenders, particularly among juveniles, and the inordinately severe impact of crime on our elderly."

"I have repeatedly observed young people come into my court, certain that I will not sentence them to jail if convicted; an attitude developed by years of leniency shown them in the juvenile system. The juvenile offender must be shown that the courts are firm as well as fair and that society will not tolerate continued criminal behavior."

"In dealing with crime perpetrated against our senior citizens we should take into account the added risk of dangerous physical and psychological trauma which so often results from violence of this kind. We must, I feel, take a hard line in this area."

"Finally, I believe that work programs should be developed on a state-wide level much as I have begun within the City of Las Vegas. Work crews could easily be used on highway construction and maintenance, and in many other projects."

MIKE MALONE TRIES FOR THIRD TERM JACK KENNEY RUNS FOR SENATE

Assemblyman Mike Malone announced he will be a candidate for his third term in the Nevada legislature representing Assembly District 4.

Malone, who compiled a 100 per cent voting and attendance record during the 1979 and 1981 legislative sessions, served both terms on the Judiciary, Education and Elections Committees in addition to many subcommittees.

He presently is serving on the Interim Civil Employees Retirement Committee, the Legislative Commission, Intergovernmental Personnel Advisory Council and the Advisory Commission on the Allocation of the Educational Block Grant Fund.

During the 1981 session, Malone was co-sponsor of tougher drunk driving laws which are now in effect.

He also supported one of the nation's largest percentage and benefit increases to state and local funding for schools, and backed the fire safety law requiring retrofitting of hotels.

The Las Vegas Republican said his priorities for the 1983 session will be tougher criminal laws, tax reform and continued updating of strict gaming control laws.

Malone, who served 20 years in the U.S. Navy, is a 14-year veteran of the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department. He and his wife live at 508 Estella Avenue.

District 4 is roughly bounded by Craig Road on the north, West Sahara Avenue on the south, Rancho Drive on the east and Jones Boulevard.



Las Vegas businessman Jack Kenney announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination to the United States Senate from Nevada at a press conference recently. The press conference, in the Shiloh Room of the Showboat Hotel, was the first stop in a three day, twelve-stop tour of Nevada.

Kenney said that he believes that the Senate needs a Nevadan who is a small businessman and who knows Nevada. "Having been in business

here since 1959, I understand Nevada's problems and also its great opportunities," Kenney said.

Kenney, 48, is a Las Vegas homebuilder. He has been a member of the Republican Senatorial Trust Committee, the National Association of Homebuilders, the Conservative Caucus of Nevada, and Citizens for Private Enterprise. This is Jack Kenney's first attempt at statewide office.

JENKINS FILES FOR COUNTY COMMISSION



26 year area resident Gary Jenkins filed Tuesday as a candidate for County Commission, District "A." Jenkins, 33, is a Democrat.

An owner of a local

dry cleaning business with 6 outlets throughout the county, Jenkins is a product of our local school system, having graduated from Valley High School where he served as Student Body President and lettered in baseball, basketball and football.

Jenkins attended El Camino College, Los Angeles, and went on to UNLV, having received a base-

ball scholarship.

The youthful candidate said he will campaign on the issues affecting the county in general, and particularly the needs of his constituents in District "A."

Jenkins, who retained veteran political campaign manager Hank H. Pesner to coordinate his campaign, stated that he will work closely with the respective town boards and improvements associations in the district and will designate liaison people who will
