THE NUCLEAR FREEZE "We have been relying too much on the promise that God made after the flood not to destroy the world again. But then the promise was that

he would not bring another flood upon the world to destroy it. The frightening potential for nuclear destruction however is too real to be ignored." This view was taken by Rabbi Gilbert Klaperman, the newly elected president of the Rabbinical Council of America. He was probably the first Orthodox leader to call for a nuclear freeze in this country, while however adding, "under the guaranteed protection for our country's potential to maintain effective deterrent posture."

The remarks by Klaperman best exemplified the growing participation and concern expressed within the Jewish community supporting the freeze movement. A recent two - day seminar in New York sponsored by the California-based Emet Foundation appealed for greater Jewish involvement in the freeze movement. The participants in that conference could not be classified as radicals or dismissed as leftists for they represented a broad spectrum of Jewish denominational affiliation and political views while all appearing to share a similar sense of urgency regarding the nuclear threat.

The Jewish Community Relations Council of Greater Philadelphia recently adopted a resolution which said: "No issue threatens our existence..more than the specter of nuclear warfare. For the Jewish community, discussion of a 'nuclear holocaust' is more than a metaphor. Our history teaches us that man is

war in Lebanon proved the Palestine Liberation Organization and its political line to be worthless.

They recognize that the path chosen by the PLO has resulted in "a tragedy for the Arabs, for the people in Lebanon," Burg said. He suggested therefore that the Palestinians in the occupied territories now see the autonomy negotiations as their best hope. Now that the PLO has been defeated, there is a better chance to find Palestinian moderates

capable of perpetrating unspeakable acts, and further, that silence in the face of inhumanity is equivalent to complicity in that injustice."

In another action, more than 100 religious and secular Jewish leaders, including dozens of rabbis, three members of Congress and four Nobel Prize winners, signed a "Shalom Aleichem" statement urging all American Jews to address the issue of thermo - nuclear world disaster and the need for controlling and reversing the arms race. The statement was initiated by the editorial board of Menorah, a monthly journal published in Washington, D.C. and edited by Arthur Waskow.

The freeze movement is new, while the peace movement is not. For years there has been an urgency stressed over the growing fear and prospect of nuclear war. Different this time around, unlike in the 50s and 60s, is the size and political magnitude of this movement. The Reagan Administration, somewhat heeding the calls for a nuclear freeze or by others. of an outright reduction, has countered with meeting the Soviet Union at the negotiating table with the Strategic Arms Reduction Talks, more commonly known as START.

One leading observer of the nuclear freeze movement noted that this peace movement, essentially what it is at its core, will run parallel to the Administration's efforts at the tables with START. Accordingly, this journa-list said this will mean a revival of the old popular joke in Russia during the peace campaign in the 1950's:

A Jew went to his Rabbi and asked: "Rabbi, is there going to be war?" "There will be no war," said the Rabbi, "but there will be such a struggle for peace that no stone will be left standing." Hopefully, with the recent actions of some Jewish community members, as a good start, the Jewish community will help in this cause.
