

## DANGER FOR CAMP DAVID ACCORDS

There have been signals emanating from Washington and European capitals of an effort to capitalize on the PLO's defeat in Lebanon by seeking movement in the direction of a resolution to the Palestinian question in the Middle East. These indications have surfaced from statements recently enunciated by Secretary of State George Shultz, Egyptian Minister of State for Foreign Affairs Butros Ghali and French Foreign Minister Claude Cheysson.

While movement on autonomy negotiations in accordance with the Camp David process has been advocated by Israeli officials in recent weeks once the PLO evacuation is completed, the signals offered from other officials

indicate an attempt to change the rules while the game is still in play.

Shultz has recently said the Camp David accords are open to interpretation, that it can be viewed in several ways and that the Palestinians should have a role in determining the conditions under which they live.

Cheysson has said the PLO, being the only representative of the Palestinian people, should be included in negotiations for autonomy on the West Bank and Gaza Strip.

Ghali sees the departure of the PLO from Beirut as presenting the situation now to find an overall political solution to the Palestinian problem.

There are currently efforts underway internationally to present what is known as a joint Egyptian - Franco Middle East initiative that would focus on modification of the UN Security Council Resolution 242, which has become the

bedrock of U.S. policy in the region.

The joint initiative seeks to replace the characterization of Palestinians as "refugees" as it is now contained in Resolution 242. The joint draft is also likely to call for some sort of PLO "participation" in the peace process, although it is not clear what the dimensions of this "participation" would be.

While these efforts are in progress and the Administration appears to be rethinking its attitude to the autonomy negotiating process, the Jewish community must remain acutely aware of the changing signals from Washington and other capitals and seek to mobilize its resources to defeat any effort which deviates from the proposals set forth at Camp David.
