FRENCH RABBI SPEAKS ON ANTI-SEMITISM

NEW YORK (WNS) -- Visiting the United States for the first time since the wave of terrorist attacks Jewish and against Israeli installations rocked France, Rinat Sirat, the Chief Rabbi of France said here that while he was not sure of the reasons behind the attacks, he suggested it may be that the French Jewish community "affirms its Jewishness."

Speaking at a news conference sponsored by the World Jewish Congress -- American Section, Sirat suggested that the elements responsible for the rash of terattacks is rorists part of an organized effort by extremist groups to "destabilize Western democracies." He said it appears clear that "The community Jewish of France has been singled out....

Addressing the issue of anti - Semitism in France and the terrorist attacks which culminated in the killing of six people

and wounding of 22 at Jo - Goldenberg's restaurant in the heart of Paris' Jewish Quarter, Sirat would not attribute these directly to a climate of incitement which may have been created in France, as some have suggested, nor would he blame the media coverage of for its "Peace for Israel's Galilee" operation.

"It is not my intention to condemn the press in general terms or to formulate any judgement," the Rabbi declared, "Ibelieve that journalists are responsible to their own conscience . . . but it seems to me that a certain amount of responsibility called for" when covering events like Israel's action in Lebanon.

He then cited as an example the recent incident in which an allegedly armless Lebanese infant was pictured in newspapers around the world and which was reported to be displayed on President Reagan's desk as a symbol of the

suffering in Lebanon as a result of Is-rael's invasion. Israeli officials, after investigating the fate of the child, found that the child's arms were intact.

United Press International which circulated the photo and caption said that culated the it regretted the error. H. L. Stevenson, UPI editor - in - chief, attributed the error to "the confusion at the time, at the hospital and in the city" Beirut where the photo was taken.

Sirat also said that the current adminis-tration of President

Francois Mitterrand has expressed sincere concern over the recent events and has initiated a program in an effort to combat terrorist activities on French soil. Sirat suggested that time was needed to see if the plans outlined by Mitterrand will have an effect. He said that while steps have been taken to curtail violent like the incidents attack on Goldenberg's restaurant, no arrests have yet been made of any of those responsible. "What is

grave in my eyes is the fact that over the years, no terrorists have been arrested, which can be taken as a sign of encouragement to other terto continue rorists and increase their attacks," Sirat said. Asked whether there was any "plan of ac-tion" which the Jewish community might take to combat future terrorist attacks, Si-rat replied: "Plans are the of action responsibility of go-vernment, and I, as a rabbi, have a more spiritual task."
