15,000 ATTEND CHILD'S FUNERAL IN ROME

(WNS) --ROME About 15,000 people, virtually the entire Jewish population of this city, attended the funeral services held October 12 for two year old Stephano Tasche, who was killed when unidentiwho was fied gunmen attacked worshippers Jewish outside the main synagogue. The funeral was an occasion of mourning and catharsis for the Jews of Rome. The Jewish had community blamed the media for creating a climate violence in which against Jews was permissible and the release of emotions at the funeral enabled a reconciliation of sorts between Italy's Jews and the Italian officialdom.

The terrorist at tack, in which 37 people were wounded, including women and young children in a hail of machinegun fire and grenade frag-ments, came on the heels of the reception given to Palestine Liberation Organization chief, Yasir Arafat, by President Snandro and Pope Pertini John Paul II. That was seen by Italian Jews as the legitimization of a terrorist leader and arch - enemy of Israel and the Jewish people. Jews were with the Itafurious lian media for what they considered unfair criticism of Israel's actions in Lebanon, bordering on anti - Semitism. The Rome Jewish community isolated it-self and rejected all expressions of sympathy, "Words serve little purpose," de-clared Chief Rabbi Elio Toaff,

At the funeral, however, Toaff and President Pertini embraced and the Chief Rabbi spoke of reconciliation, reconstruction and peace. No Italian authorities had been

invited to the burial services, although the community announced that "whoever wished could come." Pertini came, accompanied by Premier Giovanni Spadolini, the only senior minister who had refused to greet President Arafat. Pertini kissed the tiny coffin of the dead child whom the Chief Rabbi designated a "holy martyr" of Ju-daism. There were also Christian friends among the mourners, some former partisan fighters and sur-vivors of the Holocaust which took the lives of many non-Jews in Italy during World War II.

The president of the Union of Italian Jewish communities, Otto Lenghi, spoke just before the cortage set off on its sombre march through the streets of Rome. He said the procession had been decided on to "break through the isolation into which Rome's Jews plunged themselves after Saturday's tragedy. The cortege moved slowly from Tiberine Island which houses the Fatebenefratelli Hospital where many of the injured in the terrorist attack were treated and where young Stephano's mother, recovering from wounds watched tearfully, to the main where synagogue Rabbi Toaff recited prayers. It ended in front of the Pantheon. The marchers

included a massive turnout of teenagers. They carried signs reading, "The Jewish People Live," and "We Italians are all wounded Jews" along with many other placards.

But while reconciliation was in the air, the mood of the mourners remained bitter. Most Jews boycotted an official day of mourning Oct. ll, proclaimed by the municipal, provincial and regional govern-ments and the federation of trade unions. The one delegation Jewish was led by architect Bruno Zevi who re-cited a list of accusations and demanded passage of a law that would make anti-Se-mitism a criminal mitism a offense. Italian factories and businesses observed a two hour work stoppage and bus drivers called for a strike to demonstrate solidarity with Rome's

Meanwhile, the terrorists who perpetrated the assault on the synagogue been aphave not prehended. But Abu Nidal, a shadowy figure in the rogues gallery of Palestinian terrorists emerged as the prime suspect behind the attack, Italian police, who have the cooperation of the French police in the case, determined that the weapons used in Rome were of the same type as those employed in attacks on Jews and others.

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WITH SHULTZ

WASH. (WNS) --Israeli Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir emerged from a fourhour meeting with Secretary of State George Shultz and announced that Israel and the U.S. would working set up a group to discuss their proposals for the early withdrawal of foreign troops from Lebanon. Shamir, who presented Shultz with proposals drafted by the Israeli Cabinet, would not re-veal any details of the Cabinet's po-sitions. He declined to discuss a reported two - tier security plan for south Lebanon that the Cabinet was said to have suggested.

said his Shamir talk with Shultz, which lasted two hours longer than had been seheduled, was held in a "spirit of friendly consultation." He said they were trying to find a common solution to withdrawal and ensuring the security of the Lebanese - Israeli border.
