ISRAEL TO ESTABLISH NEW SETTLEMENTS ON WEST BANK

NEW CONGRESS WILL BE FRIENDLY TO ISRAEL

BEVERLY HILLS, California -- The American Jewish Committee's Washington Representative predicted that the new Congress would be "basically friendly" to Israel in the coming months, but he cautioned that unqualified American support for Israel on all issues could not be taken for granted and he admonished those concerned about Israel to heed American thinking if they wanted to champion Israel's cause effectively.

Hyman Bookbinder asserted also that, despite its rejection by both Israel and the Arab nations, President Reagan's peace plan would be the "basic vehicle for Middle East diplo-

macy" in the months ahead.

"How long and how tightly the Reagan Administration will stay the course' with Mr. Reagan's September peace initiative remains to be seen," said Mr. Bookbinder, "but it would appear imprudent for any of the parties to believe that Washington will soon abandon the plan,"

However, he emphasized, President Reagan's plan "does not necessarily affect other actions that will require attention by the Administration; the Camp David autonomy talks, the search for a new and free Lebanon, proposed arms sales to Jordan and

ISRAEL'S UN AMBASSADOR HAD MISUNDERSTANDING ON MATTER

JERUSALEM (WNS) -- Israel reaffirmed that it will continue undaunted its settlement policy on the West Bank following a report on the Voice of Israel Radio that Israel's Ambassador to the U.S., Moshe Arens, had suggested to Premier Menachem Begin that Israel suspend for a six month period the establishment of new settlements on the occupied territories.

According to the Radio broadcast, Arens made that proposal in mid - September. He said Israel should announce suspension of further settlements for six months and that Begin should invite King Hussein of Jordan to the negotiating table. The radio report said Arens suggested that such moves would improve relations with the U.S. According to the report, Begin responded briefly, saying that Hussein would never
