It's Hussein's Game: Will He Play Ball?

Analysts who have read the fine print of the document issued by the PLO at its meeting in Algiers suspect moderation. But in the Arab-Israeli dispute, conclusions drawn from anything less than unequivocal declarations mean little to Israel. And the conclusion drawn from the Palestine National Council meeting, which is in effect the Palestinian parliament, is a clear rejection of the Reagan Middle East peace intiative. As Israeli Foreign Minister Yitzhak anamir observed, the only difference between the PNC meeting in Algiers and the one held 19 years ago in Jerusalem, is that "it moved further to Algiers."

Some believe the PNC resolution, which provided King Hussein with no mandate to negotiate with Israel on behalf of the Palestinians and also rejected the Reagan initiative as "unacceptable," gives PLO chairman Yasir Arafat room for further manuevering. This would occur, reports said, if the Reagan plan would include the code word for a Palestinian state self - determination. Such a change in the Reagan plan in the not too distant future is very unlikely. Arafat's only success at the PNC meeting was that he maintained some PLO unity, unfortunately at the expense of diplomacy and the hopes and aspirations of the Palestinian people.

So the hall lies in Hussein's court. He has no mandate from the PLO to negotiate for the Palestinian people. The PLO has rejected diplomacy and its quest for a military victory over Israel is a foregone Conclusion after the war in Lebanon last summer. The one hope for the Palestinians, is for Hussein to move into direct regitiations with Israel. Israel's settlement policy on the West Bank continues at rapid pade and at some time in the future there will be no time left for maneuvering by Arafat or Hussein. With time fleeting, the question is whether he is willing to play ball.

Arabs Turn on Israel Amid Council Debate on Libya

UNITED NATIONS (WLP) -- No less than fourteen speakers during the latest Security Council debate on the Libyan crisis deviated from the agenda item and forced themselves "to interject totally unwarranted and offensive references to Israel," Ambassador Yehuda Z. Blum charged this past week in communication to the Secretary General. He singled out Jor-

dan as the most vicious in exploiting the item which was "entirely extraneous to the Arab-Israel conflict."

Blum told the L'N chief that "the state-ments of Libya, Syria, Bulgaria and Jordan were particularly noteworthy for their noxious and irrelevant character. In addition to his deliberate misrepresentation of both the letter and spirit of the Security Council resolution 242," Blum declared, "the new representative of Jordan deemed it necessary to devote a significant portion of his maiden statement before the Council to the maligning of my country, apparently out of fear that he might otherwise be charged with having failed to contribute sufficiently to the effort to defame Israel."

The enemies of the State of Israel felt quite at home during this late February session with Gleg Troyanovsky sitting is as President. Not once did he call for a point of order and stop the speakers for violating the rules of the Council's procedures.

Ambassador Blum pointed out in his communication to the Secretary - General that the several meetings of the Council debate on the Libyan issue had highlighted once again "three particularly important" but shameful matters:

 "Many Arab States are still gripped by an obsession with Israel so pervasive and relentless in character that they find it impossible to forego any opportunity whatsoever to interject wholly extraneous issues into international diplomatic discourse;

2. "Certain other States continue to exploit Arab fixation with Israel and Arab manipulation of the UN agenda in order to prevent discussion of inconvenient issues. Thus, by way of example, the Soviet-Union seeks to erect an iron curtain of silence around its brutal occupation of Afghanistan, Viet Nam leaps into debates in an attempt to hide its ruthless suppression of the people of Kampuchea, and Cuba strives to defect attention from the activities of its mercenary forces in Africa by continuously spouting inflammatory rhetoric on a variety of preferts.

3. "Through constant repetition of their anti - Israel litany, those Arab States attempt to deflect attention from various conflicts di-

viding the Arab world."

Libyan Ambassador Ali A. Treiki, who had involked the meeting against what he termed "U.S. aggression" and who is the very Libyan envoy facing strong community opposition over a home he bought in nearby New Jersey, opened the Council session with a vicious attack on the United States. His distribe was well answered by Ambassador Jeane Kirkpatrick who charged that "Assassination has been an important Libyan tool."

The dynamic American voice here at the LN reminded the Council that "Colonel Qaddaff has tried to accomplish his goals through a combination of economic and military aid to radical Governments, bribery of officials, help to international terrorists by providing sanctuary, funds, weapons and planning assassination of exiled opponents and planned assassination of target Government officials and assistance to guerrilla groups working to overthrow established Governments.

engaged in these activities almost since it took power. For example, in 1972, Libya provided sanctuary to the perpetrators of the Munich Olympic murders. Qaddafi also gave refuge to the terrorists who had taken 60 hostages at the 1975 Vienna meeting of OPEC...There is a pattern of Libyan misconduct. It constitutes a grave threat to international peace and security. The culprit in this proceeding is identified beyond any reasonable doubt or question."

Fearing a U.S. veto, the culprit did not

press for a vote.

Justin Finger, director of the ADL's national civil rights division said "The American people have a right to know, whether officials of their government abused their authority in doing business with and offering assistance to Barbie or any other perpetrators of atrocities against Jews and other civilians."
