DENNIS PRAGER TO LECTURE MARCH 14TH



Dennis Prager is the second speaker in the 1st Annual Las Vegas Jewish Community Lecture Series being held on Monday, March 14th at 7:30 P.M., at Temple Beth Sholom, Mr. Prager's topic will be "Jewish Values vs. Modern Values."

Dennis Prager is Director of Brandeis-Bardin Institute. He is co - author with Rabbi Foseph Telushkin of "The Nine Questions People Ask About Judaism," considered by many to be the finest contemporary introduction to Judaism. He has traveled throughout the world, writing on world and Jewish affairs in leading

periodicals. He has been characterized as a "charismatic moralist" whose "mission in life is to get people obsessed with what's right and wrong."

"Many Jews confuse Jewish values with contemporary liberalism. In pre-vious periods, Jews have confused Judaism

with conservatism or tely, most Jews are unaware of the distinctive values of Judaism which more often than not are in conflict with many cherished values of contemporary daism.'

The two speakers of the four - lecture series to follow are Dr. Elliot Dorff on April 17th (Sunday) in "How Does Judaism Affect Moral Thought and Behavior?", and and Behavior?", and Michael Medved on May 22nd (Sunday) in "Why Be Jewish: Three Reasons to Choose Jewish Com-mitment."

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BOMB FOUND IN PARIS

PARIS (WNS) -- A Marxism. Unfortuna- tragedy was averted when police experts found and defused a powerful bomb that had been placed in a crowded Jewish meeting hall in Marseilles where children were about to stage a Purim play. Marseilles police said the bomb, which was discovered about a half hour befor the festivities were to begin, placed where it "would do the most damage,' near the back of the

Marseilles Mayor Gaston Defferre, who was to address the gathering, later said the bomb was "an anti-Semitic attack. It was set to explode in the middle of the Jewish Purim festival and hurt as many people as possible." He dismissed police speculation that the bomb was linked either to the forthcoming municipal elections, which Deferre running, or to his crackdown on Corsican extremists in his capacity as Interior Minister, "The bomb was obviously aimed at the city's Jewish community," he asserted.

A routine police check discovered the bomb in the men's room at the back of the hall in which over 500 people were expected. At the time, only the organizers, about 30, were inside the building. They were evacuated while police experts checked the entire hall building. The children's Purim festival was organized by the Keren Kayemth Israel (Jewish National Fund) and a local Jewish radio station. No one claimed responsibility for plant-

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ing the bomb but police said the explosive was of a type similar to that used by Corsican extremists.



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
