"increasing number of converts to Judaism and what this means to Jewish life."
On Tuesday evening, April 12, Dr. Egon Mayer, Associate Professor of Sociology at Brooklyn College, New York, will discuss "Jews by Choice and their Impact on the Jewish Community."
Rabbi Stephen Lerner of Teaneck, New Jersey will respond to Dr. Mayer's presentation.

Rabbi Frankel, who serves Am Yisrael Conservative Congregation of North Shore in Chicago, stated that four concurrent workshops had been scheduled on philosophy with RabbiGordon Tucker, Assistant Professor of Philosophy at the Jewish Theological Seminary; on Talmud with Rabbi David Gordis, Associate Professor of Talmud and Vice-President of the Jewish Theological Se-minary and the University of Judaism in Los Angeles, and a session on theology presented by Dr. Schubert M. Ogden, Professof of Theology at Southern Methodist University.

The final workshop will hear two Dallas Rabbis, Jordan S. Ofseyer, of Congregation Shearith Israel (Conservative) and Jack Bemporad of Temple Emanu - El (Reform) analyze the various aspects of life for Jews in the Bible Belt.

Two nationally prominent Jewish leaders, Rabbi Arthur Hertzberg, Englewood, New Jersey, a Vice-President of the World Jewish Congress and Rabbi Joseph Sternstein, Roslyn Heights, New York, immediate past President of the American Zionist Federation, will present differing views on "Israel at the Crossroads" on Monday evening, April II. Rabbi Stanley Rabinowitz of Washington, D.C. will serve as Chairman.

Wednesday evening, a dinner meeting at Shearith Israel will pay a special tribute to the late Abraham Joshua Heschel, noted Conservative Jewish theologican and social action leader. The principal tribute to Dr. Heschel will be given by Dr. Gerson D. Cohen, Chancellor of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, New York City.

Earlier in the day the Conservative Rabbis will devote their meeting to a discussion on "Developments in Hala-chah," Speakers include: Rabbi Kassel Abelson, Minneapolis, Rabbi David Feldman, Brooklyn, N. Y., and Rabbi Phillip Sigal, Grand Rapids.

During the opening day, the RA members will participate in special memory observances for those Jews lost during the Holocaust as part of the annual Yom Hashoah servance. This ceremony will be held with members of the Dallas Jewish Community. Addressing the meeting will Rabbi Morris Shapiro of Melville, New York.
