

Issues raised by the Orthodox Jewish leadership group reflectreligious ed their orientation. Referring to the Administration's peace plan that would give Jordan's King Hussein a measure of control over the West Bank, one leader pointed out that during the 1948 to 1967 period that Hussein controlled the West Bank, Jews of all countries were forbidden to enter even to pray at Jewish holy places. Asked why, then, Hussein is regarded by the U.S. as a "moderate," Ambassador Cluberius replied, "Moderate is a relative term. The fact is, Hussein does want to join the peace process, but he needs support to do Arab so."
