opens the door wider for Moscow to try to outdo the U.S. as a Middle East power broker.

At America's expense, there are notes of gladness in Moscow and Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, these fine Spring days.

In the Kremlin, Yuri Andropov and his braintrusters are rejoicing over the news that President Reagan is punishing Israel by holding up the delivery of 75 F-16 fighter jets. This makes the Russians doubly pleased with Moscow's recent decision to ship MIG 23 fighter planes, new tanks, rocket launchers, and anti-aircraft missiles to Syria.

In Saudi Arabia Yasir Arafat must have had a good laugh with Crown Prince Fahd over the report that the Saudis are thinking about weasling out of the \$8.5 billion AWACS deal as a portion of their determination to trim their \$20 billion defense budget. (Arafat stopped off in Riyadh on his way to Jordan.)

Remember the AWACS firestorm of late 1981? Opponents of the deal were told that providing all that radar, surveillance, and communications equipment was the cornerstone of America's Middle East defense program. In return for the hardware, the U.S. was promised by King Khalid that Saudi Arabia would give us valuable assisLance in ending the Arab - Israeli conflict. The President's current decision to cut off the military sales to Israel took the State Department by surprise. Secretary Shultz and his staff had long been silent about the shipment delay. But Mr. Reagan, in one more move to push Israel into withdrawing its 30,000 troops from Lebanon, found Israel guilty of using U.S.supplied equipment for offense. This is a conclusion difficult to understand in those Israeli families that have lost so many lives to PLO raiders striking from Lebanon.

In this, same season, Moscow insists that Israel is planning a piratic strike against Syria. By upping the quality of the military hardware it is bestowing on Syria, the Soviets hope to compensate for the drubbing Israel gave less formidable armaments Moscow had invested in Syria. Refusing to budge from the Bekaa Valley, Syria is favored with Russia's Rocket launchers and the type of early warning and surveillance technology that gave Israel firm air control when her troops entered Lebanon last June to uproot PLO forces there entrenched.

One explanation of Moscow's bestowal of such bounty on Syria is a long - standing friendship between Yuri Andropov and Syria's Hafez Assad. This warm link whets the Soviet desire tokeep a tight hold on Syria as a satellite. This, in turn,

Should all who yearn for Middle East peace be disturbed by this Syrian-Soviet coalition? Washington, troubled by the USSR's reported supply of arms to guerrillas in El Salvador, has sent a handful of advisers into that explosive countrydeside. Moscow has dispatched, not a few, but 4000 ush advisers to Syria, Advisers? Truly, a euphemism: the 4000 Russians are in Syria to operate the new and powerful armaments, pre-

dictably pointing towards Israel. Time after time, Mr. Reagan has repeated his pledge of support for Israel. Even Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger, in a rare moment, has identified Israel as a Washington asset. Perhaps it is time, then, for the U.S. to deliver those 75 F-16 fighter jets to Israel and to have a fresh look, at the 1981 American - Israeli Memorandum of Understanding, a portion of which reads thus:

"This memorandum, reaffirms the common bonds of friendship between the U.S. and Israel and builds on the mutual security relationship that exists between the two nations. The parties recognize the need to enhance strategic cooperation to deter all threats from the Soviet Union to the region....U.S. - Israel strategic cooperation, is designed against the threat to peace and security of the region caused by the Soviet Union or Soviet - controlled forces from outside the region introduced into the region."
